**Mission, Vision, Values Discernment Team Report**

*“Where there is no vision, the people perish.”*

-Proverbs 29:18

In September of 2019, the congregation commissioned three committees to service: a Mission, Vision, Values Discernment Team (Discernment Team), a Communication Team, and a Website Team. The Discernment Team was charged with the task of articulating God’s Call for PCN through three statements: a Mission Statement, a Vision Statement, and a list of Core Values.

Since late August, the Discernment Team has been at work. This team interviewed small groups of the church as well as individuals; dispersed and collected surveys; utilized the 2017 PCN Mission Study and Brown Church Development’s “Growth Positioning Study;” engaged more than a dozen Scripture passages in critical reflection regarding discipleship; and has spent hours prayerfully working to fashion the three statements they were commissioned to create.

In the process of data collection and analysis, three themes emerged at the heart of our call: We are a church “**Sent**” by God to the world. We are called to “**Make Disciples.**” We are called into “**Community.**”

**SENT:** In our Scripture study particularly, we realized that the church exists not in and for itself, but to “go” in the name of Christ. We are a people on a mission sent to the nations to be the hands and feet of Christ not only in care, service, and study but in reaching out and inviting others into our community where God welcomes all with open arms. We extend the love of Christ with our lives. Being ‘sent’ bears with it the call to move, to not be complacent and comfortable, but ready at a moment’s notice to follow after Jesus.

**MAKE DISCIPLES:** In Matthew's 'Great Commission' we are called to 'make disciples of all nations...' (Mat. 28). One of PCN's greatest investments and strengths has been our commitment to and study of God's Word: to education, learning, and growing as disciples. We are a congregation that seeks to help individuals grow in their faith. Making disciples is risky business. It requires continual listening, bridge building, and invitation to our neighbors to be a part of our community, God's family.

**COMMUNITY:** The reason that most people come to our church and why they keep coming back (according to our data) has been their connection with the community, with one or more persons or families, and their growth together in faith. The Christian community is different from other communities in that at its heart are relationships founded and nurtured by the *love of Christ* which shapes all that we are and do. The church community welcomes unconditionally, loves extravagantly, reaches out relentlessly, serves selflessly, and supports faithfully.

From these three themes, the Discernment Team began to do the tedious work of voicing the fruits of our discernment into three statements. The Mission Statement expresses what we do. The Vision Statement expresses what we will look like if we live into our mission as a church. The Values express what is at the core of how we live into our mission as a community. All three statements work together to paint the picture God's call for PCN. Each informs the other.

The statements below are what the Discernment Team's prayerful labor has produced. They are works in progress, as these statements are always open to change through the Holy Spirit's guidance. We have presented these statements to session and have received comments, suggestions, and even 'tweaks' to the statements.

Questions for session to consider as they read through the statements:

- 1) What do these statements say and mean to you? Do they articulate the three themes above?
- 2) Will they draw our faith community to common work?
- 3) Do they give hope for a better future?
- 4) Will they inspire community members to realize their dreams through positive, effective action?
- 5) Are they concise and memorable?
- 6) What might help make the statements more clear/concise/memorable (if anything)?

The statements are as follows:

**Mission Statement:**

“The Mission of PCN is to welcome all, to grow together in Christ’s love, and to serve neighbors everywhere.”

**Vision Statement:**

“PCN is a beacon of God’s love: an exciting, thriving, visible community.”

**Core Values:**

Joyful, relevant worship  
Grow in God’s Word *toward Christian maturity*  
Boldly share the Good News of Christ  
Serve compassionately in Christ’s name  
Support one another in Christian love

**Presbytery is Coming to Novato on February 8!**

Presbyterian church government emphasizes that the leadership of the church is shared between those called to be ministers and church members called to be elders within the congregation – we use the terms Teaching Elder to refer to ministers and Ruling Elder to refer to church members called to be elders.

Presbyterian elders are both elected and ordained. Through ordination they are officially set apart for service and retain their ordination beyond their term in office. (Ministers who serve the congregation are also part of the session.) The session is the smallest, most local governing body. The other governing bodies are presbyteries, which are composed of several churches; synods, which are composed of several presbyteries; and the General Assembly, which represents the entire denomination. Elders and ministers who serve on these governing bodies are also called presbyters.

PCN belongs to the Presbytery of the Redwoods, which is composed of 47 additional congregations, totaling about 5,300 members. Our geography stretches from just north of the Golden Gate Bridge (Sausalito/Marin City) all the way along the coast to

the Oregon border. Our presbytery meets to worship and conduct business three times a year – the first meeting of 2020 will be hosted by Novato on Saturday, February 8.

In addition to Adam and me (I currently am serving as the Associate Stated Clerk), PCN's presbyters are Carol Dacquisto, Robert Coleman, Ellen Breazeale, and Bill Walker. If you would like to see our polity in action, you are welcome to attend! We will begin with worship at 10:00 a.m. and conclude our business by 3:00 p.m. As a guest, you would have "privilege of voice" but not of vote. Just like during our congregational meetings, in which only members are entitled to vote, so too are only active presbyters able to vote for presbytery matters.

If you are interested in possibly serving on a presbytery-level committee, please let me know. Terms begin on July 1 of each year. We have had a number of PCN friends contribute their many and varied gifts and talents over the years... I'd love to talk to you more about that possibility!

On Joyful Giving

This new year of 2020 brings with it many opportunities to joyfully respond to the graces given to us by God. In my service year – only about 4 months in – I have been challenged to think about how and where my time, money, and talents are invested.

I am privileged to give a year of my time to the volunteer work placements at Living Waters Center of Hope and Eliot Presbyterian Church. With them, I am able to devote my days to serving others and helping organize and run the events offered by the organizations. As a resource, time has been one of the easiest for me to give. I recognize others in this area and back in Marin might be working longer than 40-hour work weeks. This makes time a valuable commodity that cannot always be given freely and without consequence.

Time spent at work, we can hope, leads to financial stability. To praise God for the stability, no matter how small, I was taught to tithe on the money I worked for. Whether that was one dollar from the \$10 I got from babysitting my cousins or 10% of my weekly income the summer I worked at school, I would bring my small contribution to church to be both spiritually invested in the life of the church as well as financially invested. This year, it has been difficult for me to reconcile receiving a small stipend and realizing that tithing with money is not as feasible as it was before coming to Boston. While I don't have the monetary resources to give back to and invest in the church community like I did in Novato, I joyfully give in other ways.

My passions and talents allow me to develop projects to liven the congregation of Eliot. I have used my time in concert with my talents to invest in a churchwide service project on MLK Sunday. I have been grateful to learn that when monetary investment in a church is too difficult, I don't stop engaging – I find ways to invest elsewhere. I would encourage all who find it hard to give 10% to not give up on giving. Give where you still feel invested in the life of the congregation.

It doesn't need to be money, though, that helps most tangibly to further the call and mission of the church. It can be your time: Perhaps you join the faithful youth leaders or table parents; you devote a Saturday to clean up the sanctuary and church property; you answer the call of the nominating committee and join in meeting with others in the congregation to discuss and improve the workings of the church. It can be your talents: Maybe you have a musical gift that can be utilized in the choir or praise band; you might be gifted at teaching the Word and want to lead a small group or Bible study. All are ways of giving!



## Reserves Create Financial Stability By Tonya Church, Finance and Administration Elder

Presbyterian Church of Novato currently has two equity funds which are considered our main reserves. Reserves create financial stability for our church because we have been able to increase these funds over the last five years. So why are these funds so important to our financial stability, where did they come from and what are these funds used for?

Reserves should be viewed in light of their designated purpose. Currently, we have two reserve accounts, the operating reserve and the property reserve. Reserves help us be financially stable so that we can pay for unexpected expenses or those that exceed already-budgeted authority. This helps us focus on ministry instead of paying bills by having our pastor make announcements about special offerings. Our history has not included money conversations very often, especially to cover unexpected or one-time expenses. One of the Finance and Administration Committee's goals is to keep our church focused on ministry.

Where did these funds come from? The funds generate from money that is collected and not spent in that budgeted year. Each year we carefully craft the budget to anticipate expenditures. For 2019, we underestimated the utilities by just over \$300. This is just one example of why it is hard to balance, because weather and utility cost increases are unknowns. At the end of the year, the surplus is realized after all the expenditures are based with the savings for the entire year. This year we had a surplus of \$22,299.39. Each January, Session votes on the distribution of these funds. For 2019, the surplus was designated to the operating reserve.

What are these funds and how are they used? The operating reserve should be viewed as a savings account. We have voted to use our operating reserve for expenses that are a one-time occurrence or for items for which funding was not previously anticipated and would not be beneficial to wait until it can be budgeted during the next cycle. We anticipate introducing our new website in 2020. If we want

to add modules or other services such as livestreaming, this would be paid for out of the operating reserve. This would allow us to start the program now, and budget for this expense in 2021. This is just one example. This type of budgeting and spending pattern allows us flexibility should needs arise. We currently have just over \$210,000 in our operating reserve, which is a little more than three months of our operating budget. Our goal is to have four to six months of operating expenses in reserve.

The property reserve is designated for all expenses related to property and the maintenance of our buildings. The property reserve has been growing over the past few years, with a maximum threshold of \$250,000. Finance and Administration thought this amount would be helpful in light of trying to maintain our older facilities. We repaired a leaky pipe in December with funds from the property reserve. If you did not hear about the repair, we take that as a compliment because our focus is on ministry not money for repairs.

Thank you again for being a generous church, as this generosity provides many benefits for our congregation.



# Session

## Session Highlights January 2020

- 1) Session approved the transfer of the 2019 budget surplus of \$22,299.39 to the operating reserve.
- 2) Session approved the worship committee's recommendation to provide up to \$8,000 for updating of the sanctuary sound system by *Loud and Clear Music Company*.
- 3) Worship Committee motion of allowing guest pastors to officiate at weddings held in the PCN sanctuary with approval by PCN pastoral staff and Session was passed. The Session asked the worship committee to update the price schedule for weddings, memorials, and receptions held on the PCN campus.
- 3) The \$150,000 budget allocations recommended by the mission committee were approved.
- 4) Pastor Adam reviewed the work of the Mission/Vision/Values Discernment Team with the Elders. The congregation will receive an update on their work at the congregational meeting on January 26, 2020.

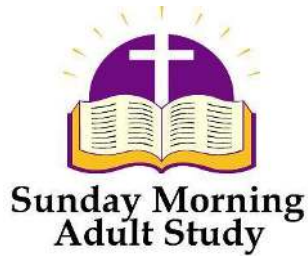

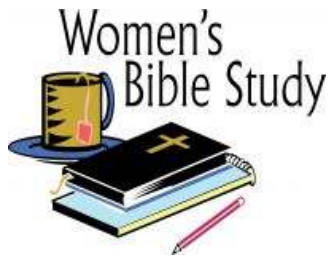
In the months of March, April and May 2020 we will be focusing on “**Justice and the Prophets**” as presented in the Old Testament prophets. Amos, Habakkuk, Micah, and Malachi show that the laws of God require justice for the poor and the oppressed and call on the nation’s leaders to practice justice.

The lessons for Palm Sunday and Easter examine the promised Messiah as the defender of justice, while the lesson on Esther demonstrates the prevailing of God’s justice even in pagan nations.

Finally, Jeremiah calls on the people to repent injustices or face destruction by the Babylonians, while lessons in Zephaniah, Zechariah, and Hosea present both a judgment against the wickedness and injustice of the nation and a vision of restoration when God’s people turn to Him.

## **1 & 2 SAMUEL**

They open with the capture of the ark of the covenant by the Philistines (as a result of the Lord's anger over the corruption of the priesthood) and the story of a young Samuel. When the ark is returned after causing widespread harm to the Philistines, Samuel, who is now Israel's divinely appointed judge, must convince Israel to repent its sins and give their hearts fully to God. Can a nation tormented by fear and sorrow respond in obedience? Join us as we explore this on the following days in February:
