Adam Smith Embrace the Mystery

I remember greeting members of the congregation as they filed out of the sanctuary on Easter Sunday years ago. Most people, as usual, were kind and gracious with their smiling faces shining back at my own. And then...I stood face to face with Bob...who was not smiling. He wore the scowl of a man who felt cheated. "Adam, that was a good sermon...but you reeealy disappointed me, son," he sighed with despair. As I kindly invited him to have a chat after I finished greeting folks, he continued his criticism. "You had this ONE opportunity to tell all these visitors exactly HOW Jesus rose from the dead and HOW God saved us, but you missed it!! I am so disappointed!" And then...he walked off.

Days later I shared my sermon with my pastor cohort group. After reading it together one of my colleagues said matter of factly, "Adam, there is no answer to the question, 'How?' How God does anything is a complete mystery."

And if we think about it, dear saints, the creation of the cosmos, the grace received in baptism, communion with God in the eucharist, and even resurrection are truths we confess that have no concrete answer to the question, 'How?' We do not and cannot fully know all there is to know about God and how God works. God is mysterious.

I wonder sometimes if this drives Christian apologetics' experts crazy as they seek to develop arguments and stances to defend the faith. I know, in my own experience, the mysterious God we serve can be difficult to share with others, especially those who have little experience with faith in the inexplicable. And Easter - resurrection - is a tough pill to swallow for some. After all, in our post-Enlightenment world, we've shunned the idea of mystery and replaced it with verifiable answers. Answers are more desirable in the sense that they seemingly give us control of the world around us. When we can quantify everything, we can control our own destiny. Mystery, on the other hand, begs us to ask more questions, inspires our imagination, prompts ongoing dialogue and cooperation, and keeps us moving forward. Mystery squashes the arrogance of certainty and keeps minds open to possibility.

We need mystery as much as we need answers in this life.

As we journey through Eastertide and into Pentecost together in worship, we will be exploring the mystery of Jesus' resurrection through a series called: "From Death to Life: Stories of Resurrection." We will be traveling through the book of Acts to uncover the effects of resurrection on the community of faith. While we cannot know the answer to the question 'how,' we can explore the life-giving power of resurrection as it reshapes and transforms the world forever. We can begin to paint a picture that, while still shrouded in mystery, addresses two even more important questions about resurrection: 'why?' and 'so what?'

Blessings to you, dear saints, whose lives have been claimed by this Paschal mystery. May God open our hearts and minds to Christ's transforming power each and every day.

If you've attended a recent Inquirer's class with me, you know that I love to talk about our polity – how we are governed. As a quick refresher, every congregation is governed by its church council, or Session. Each congregation belongs to a presbytery (we belong to the Presbytery of the Redwoods), and each presbytery belongs to a synod. There are 16 synods that report up to the national church; we belong to the Synod of the Pacific. For those of you who have been members of our congregation for a while, you may remember Rev. Nancy Martin Vincent – she recently began her new role as Synod Executive.

At PCN, there are fifteen elders, who are elected by the congregation and who serve as officers of the church. The word "elder" comes from scripture and is the source of the name of our Presbyterian denomination. *Presbuteros* means "elder" in Greek and refers to someone who is mature in their faith and knowledge. Elders in the Presbyterian Church are ordained to their work, as are deacons and ministers of the Word and Sacrament. Elders in our congregation are normally elected to serve three-year terms on Session. Once a person is elected and ordained as an elder in the Presbyterian Church, he or she remains a Presbyterian elder, even after he or she is no longer actively serving on Session, and even if the person moves to a different Presbyterian church. Once an elder, always an elder!

Session oversees the business and policy of the church. We have a number of committees with dedicated leadership: Mission (Mike Robinson and Ellen Brezeale), Finance and Administration (Tonya Church and Joe Simmons), Property (Bill Walker and Don Erba), Worship (Dan Rice and Delane Ramser), Membership and Outreach (Ruth Haas and Bev Winsor), Program and Fellowship (Patty Reed), Christian Education (Hilary Kinney and Walt Campbell), Personnel (Susi Lynam), and Stewardship (Brad Praun). These elders, along with their associated committees, are the groups that make things happen around here. As you consider your role as part of the body of Christ, and the gifts with which you have been blessed, I'd urge you to join one of these committees to help make things happen and to be an active participant by guiding the life of our congregation. Or, this summer when the Nominating Committee begins their discernment process to call people to serve as elders and deacons, that you would prayerfully consider saying "yes!" to be an ordained officer of the church.



- (2) **Nickels for Nets:** Each month our members donate at least 5 cents for mosquito nets to help stamp out malaria in the world. When added together,


even the smallest donation will make a difference in the world when added together.

So many of us enjoyed the cross covered with calla lilies gracing the church on Easter Sunday. It is a tradition that began many years ago. Back then our Christmas tree was a real tree (today we have an artificial one). However, in the early days of the real tree, when it was taken down the trunk was stripped of branches and laid out on the ground in back of the church where it rested until Easter time. The trunk was then cut into two pieces, which were fashioned into a cross. This was then covered with the calla lilies collected from members' gardens and placed in the sanctuary to celebrate the risen Christ. What a symbol that was! We used it to celebrate the birth of the Christ child and then later it celebrated the triumphal message of the empty cross. This tradition vanished when the church purchased the artificial tree, which now is always the correct height and is not disposed of yearly.
