This foundation work has nothing to do with brick and mortar, but is the work of understanding, clarifying, and articulating our identity and call from God. Who is PCN? What are PCN's unique Mission, Vision, and Values? The answers to these questions reflect God's call for us at PCN and offer us a unified sense of direction in our ministry, program, and building needs.

HOW THE FOUNDATION WORK BEGINS



In order to do this discernment work the Church Development Committee has created and recruited for a **MISSION/VISION COMMITTEE** that will engage in prayerful discernment, with input from the congregation, to help fashion mission, vision, and values statements that reflect who we are and where God is calling us. This

team, that will be led by a member of PCN (TBD), is representative of our congregation in all demographics. The members include: Kay Walker, Tali Sundberg, Mike Winsor, Walt Campbell, and Don Brand. We hope to recruit one or two more people.

This team will utilize our 2017 Mission Study, Brown Church Development Group's Growth Positioning Study, Scripture, conversation with you, the congregation, and combine it with a lot of prayer and listening for the Holy Spirit in order to accomplish its work.

The Church Development Committee has also created two other subcommittees:

COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE to help communicate with the Session and the congregation the activity of the Church Development Committee and the two other subcommittees. Building a strong foundation requires good communication.

WEBSITE COMMITTEE that – while not directly involved with the foundation work – will be working to address another of our congregation's needs, namely to choose a new website provider that will create a more professional, user-friendly, and easier to edit church website. Our website is often the first impression we give to those outside our congregation.

As Adam referenced in his article this month, we have been engaged in a lot of discernment work related to our future. In the mid-2000s, we started looking at the feasibility of either building a new fellowship hall or renovating the existing CE building. Due to many reasons, predominantly the economic downturn in 2008, the decision was made to hold off on any significant campus development plans and initiate a capital campaign.

In 2017, a new committee was formed and, in the summer of 2018, solicited bids to evaluate potential partners to PCN regarding new development. Ultimately, Brown Church Development Group was selected. Their consulting framework begins with ministry development, which may or may not include physical campus development. Following the decision to enter into a contractual agreement with Brown CDG in the fall of 2018, a new implementation team was formed to begin programmatic work which included, among other things, a congregational survey, leadership surveys, in-depth interviews, as well as a demographic analysis of Novato.

Brown CDG's first deliverable to PCN was a study that identified factors limiting PCN's growth as well as identifying strengths of our ministry, with the goal of shaping our vision for the future. This "Growth Positioning Study" provided some immediate ministry actions items, three of which the implementation team believed would provide the most traction. Based on that recommendation, Session approved the formation of three sub-committees that would report back to the implementation team (which reports to Session): a communications team, a website team, and a mission/vision team. Greater details about the focus areas for each of those groups are included in Adam's article this month.

On September 8, the implementation team, as well as the subcommittee team members, will be commissioned to continue this important work. If you feel called to participate on any of these teams, please reach out to Adam or me! In addition, the implementation team will have a table at the Ministry Fair following worship with FAQs that you can pick up and read in more detail.

Dear Presbyterian Church of Novato,

We need your help for the 6th annual **Pedal for Protein** ride with the theme of "Keep the main thing, the main thing" in honor of pastor and P4P rider Rich Gantenbein to support food bank pantries and food projects in Redwoods Presbytery and the Presbyterian Hunger Program food justice project planting fruit trees in deforested areas and beekeeping in Nicaragua. The 2019 goal is \$60,000. All funds raised are donated through Redwood Presbytery's eight food banks that support pantries in your area. We can only reach our goal with your help. Last year we raised \$53,568, and in the first five years \$197,972! Every single dollar donated to P4P supports protein food for hungry children, seniors, the homeless and low-income working families.

Ride dates: 7-day ride September 22-28, from Orick to Santa Rosa

1-day ride September 28, Santa Rosa at Knox Presbyterian Church

How can you help raise awareness and support Pedal for Protein?

- 1. Recruit at least one rider from your congregation to ride the north coast 7-day tour and/or the 1-day Santa Rosa ride. Options are available for two to four days of riding. See www.PedalforProtein.com.
- 2. Help publicize P4P. Ideas include putting up posters at your local bike shops, grocery stores, coffee shops, etc.
- 3. Adopt a P4P or community rider. We can supply a P4P rider who needs help fundraising or, with the help of a local bike shop, offer to do the fundraising for a local cyclist to ride for your congregation. No cyclist? Create a virtual rider! It could be your pastor or your congregation as a whole.
- 4. Have a P4P fundraiser. You could hold a rummage sale and donate the proceeds to P4P.

Each 7-day rider must raise a minimum of \$500 in addition to riding 375 miles, paying registration to do the ride, train, and get their bikes ready. These riders are committed to feeding the hungry and will appreciate your help!

The Carr Fire burned 229,651 acres (359 square miles) in Shasta and Trinity counties starting on July 23, 2018. The fire started when a flat tire on a vehicle caused the rim to strike the asphalt creating a spark that set off the fire. Fed by strong winds, the fire jumped the Sacramento River, making its way into Redding. More than 38,000 people were evacuated, 1,077 homes were destroyed and eight people, died including three firefighters.

2019 Volunteer Teams

Volunteer teams will travel to Redding October 18-25, 2019 to rebuild lives working with *Hope City Response Network*, the same group we were with in Middletown the past three years. Individuals or groups may participate for the entire two weeks or just either the first or second week. There is a one-time fee of \$50 to cover team expenses. Transportation will be by personal vehicles and carpooling can be arranged.

Where Will We Stay?

Simpson Bible University has set aside a group of unoccupied student dorm rooms for our use. Each room accommodates four people in single (non-bunk) beds with one shared bathroom (cost per week per person is \$100). Three meals a day are provided by our team at one of the local churches (\$50 per week.) RV parking is being arranged (\$225 per week) or local motels are plentiful starting at \$60 per night.

Who can come?

Anyone over age 16 (youth 12 and older may work if accompanied by a parent). If you know the difference between a hammer and a potato peeler we have work for you. You do not have to have any particular skills, but there are some tasks in any construction project that may be strenuous or require specialized skills. The majority of tasks can be accomplished by anyone. Usually jobs are reduced to manageable tasks and good instruction is provided.

I am leaving August 19th to begin my year as a Young Adult Volunteer in Boston,
Massachusetts. I began looking at the YAV website because I wanted to do work that was meaningful to me. The more I dug into the program, the more it seemed like a great way to use my gifts and talents. Now that I have committed to the year, I can only explain the decision as "right."

In October of last year, I applied to the programs in Scotland, Austin, and Boston. I had the opportunity to interview with each site coordinator throughout the winter holidays and was encouraged to hear about the diversity of opportunities within each site. The food justice-focused programs offered at Boston called to me most concretely because food justice is a passion area of mine.



The Boston YAV program, also called the Boston Food Justice Young Adult Volunteer Program (BFJYAV), was the perfect fit for

my passions. I greatly value the power of presence and recognizing our common humanity over a meal. The non-profit organization I will be working with is centered on this human dignity emphasis. Living Waters: Center for Hope (https://www.livingwaterslowell.org/) is focused on helping those who want to change for the better by providing food, clothing, and other services aimed at those who are transitioning to a more stable living arrangement.

In addition to Living Waters, I will also be working with Eliot Presbyterian Church in Lowell, MA. My work will range from teaching Sunday School classes to providing updates about my work with Living Waters to doing research about pertinent justice issues affecting the area. This is also the church where I will be worshipping for the next year! I look forward to being as involved at Eliot as I have been at PCN.

I want to thank everyone at this church for being so incredibly supportive of mission work and for showing me how to be the hands and feet of Christ to other communities. COMING NEXT QUARTER SEPTEMBER through NOVEMBER 2019

"RESPONDING TO GOD'S GRACE"

This quarter focuses on faith in God and how we respond to it both personally and communally. The studies illuminate how God's grace impacts the lives of all believers, as demonstrated by their obedience, gratitude, and holy living.

The **Unit 1** lessons study God's faithfulness to Abraham by saving Lot, His answer to Hannah's prayer, and His provision to the Israelites in the Exodus despite their rebellion.

Unit 2 explores reactions to the many benefits that occurred to humans because of God's grace through the stories of Elijah and the widow of Zarephath and Jesus healing the centurion's servant and blessing the sinful woman.

Unit 3 examines letters to early churches that tell the Corinthians and Thessalonians how to live as faithful followers of Christ. First and 2 Peter teach that faith requires holy living and goodness.

The class will return to the 9 a.m. time on Sunday, September 16, 2019. We meet in the church library at the end of the breezeway. All materials are provided: adult-level guidebook, devotion booklet entitled *The Quiet Hour,* and the weekly *Power for Living* (adult, magazine-style paper profiling Christians serving the Lord all over the world).

To prepare for our first class, we suggest that you read Luke 21, chapters 5 through 22:38 and review the questions found in Lesson 13 of our study guide beginning on page 151. If you don't yet have a study guide, no worries! We will have them available on the 12th.

Lesson 13 focuses on what Jesus wanted His disciples to learn and how far short of His desires they fell. For example, the disciples' misconcep-tions about the temple prompt Jesus to teach on the end times and the events that will characterize the period between His departure and His return (Luke 21:8-19). For our first class, we'll think through and talk about what these misconceptions were and our understanding of the "end times" guided by the following guestions:

For thought and discussion, page 152:

People hold many different interpretations of "end times" passages. Rather than dwelling on what precisely is going to happen and when, what should we focus on in light of the end times (see 21:12-19, 28, 34-36)?

Question 1, page 152

Some of the disciples' misconceptions about the temple prompt Jesus to teach on the end times (see 21:5-7). What are those misconceptions?

Have you ever wondered about the black communion set used during the contemporary service? It is the only one of its kind in the United States.

(excerpts from the church newsletter dated September 27, 1966)

In 1954 Marian Merritt was president of the Chapel Guild on Okinawa. In working with the small Okinawan church, she learned that they were serving communion in tea cups, and this bothered the most devout Okinawan Christians. So Marian took an old wooden communion set from the base chapel to Bembo's Lacquer Works and had it coated with what is supposed to be the finest lacquer in the world. This was presented to the little Okinawan church one Sunday by the Chapel Guild.

From this small beginning grew the project of giving to each small Okinawan church its own lacquered communion set. Each occasion was followed by lunch with Chapel Guild members. The Okinawans considered this "breaking of bread" the greatest test of friendship.

When Marian and Bob returned to the states and Hamilton AFB, they became active members of PCN. When the purchase of a new communion set came before Session, Bob and Marian offered to contact Bembo's Lacquer Works to buy a set for this church.

By the way, Bob and Marian are my parents!
