Shh ... Don't Talk About Money

"Don't you dare talk about money, pastor. You just get up there and preach to us about Jesus." Such were the words reverberating in the church board room one Monday evening. The pastor, a bit in shock, didn't speak at first, but slowly regained her composure. "You got it, Bob."

Sunday came around. Bulletins were handed out to the congregation. The sermon title was in large, bold font: "Jesus Talked About Money: Why Don't We?"

Eleven of Jesus' forty parables talk about money. That's more than a quarter of the parables that Jesus shared. And you have to wonder: "Why?" Why is money so important to the message that Jesus was trying to share with his followers? One reason is that the way we use our money reflects what is central to our lives, "for where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Mat. 6:21).

One temptation we often face in life is divorcing our spiritual life from our worldly life. We like to compartmentalize these parts of ourselves as if they can be easily separated. But Jesus isn't interested in only part of us, but in all of us. Jesus is after our whole selves, all of who we are and were created to be. He is not after lip service or a shadow of our true selves. We see this reflected in the gospel of Matthew: "These people honor me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me" (Matthew 15:8). All of life is about discipleship. It is about following after Jesus.

It's amazing how our bank statements can reveal our hearts: our priorities, what we value in life, what we worship and serve. Perhaps that's why money was on the short list of Jesus' top teaching illustrations. Not only does it have a way of becoming an idol in and of itself (Matthew 6:24), but how we use it reflects who or what we truly worship and serve in our lives.

The thing is, our money is really a gift from God. Like all that is good in this life, our treasure comes from the Author of Life who has knit together every part of creation, every part of you, and me, and all of humanity. Who we are and what we have is because of the one who loves us so much that in spite of our blunders, mistakes, and sin, God seeks to give us new life yesterday, today, and forever.

So why are we afraid to talk about money in the church? Is it because we don't want anyone to tell us what to do with MY money...oops...I mean...God's gift to me to be used in my life of faithful discipleship?

As God "Builds for the Future" in our midst at PCN, we partner with God utilizing all the gifts and resources that God has given us including our money, not because we have to, or because some church leader says so, or because we're being good philanthropists, but for two life-giving reasons: 1) because all that we are and all that we have is a gift from God, and 2) because it is who we are in Christ. We are created to love God and love our neighbor as ourselves. We give, because Christ first gave and continues to give to us.

What we give matters. An amazing thing to me is that in spite of our brokenness, God chooses us to partner with Christ in "building for the future...," in hastening the day of the fulfillment of God's kingdom on earth as it is in heaven. With the Holy Spirit in the lead, we are the Body of Christ through whom Jesus is changing the world as we are good stewards of our gifts, talents, resources, and, yes, our money.

As we move toward Consecration Sunday on October 20th, a day where we make a covenant in our financial stewardship for the year, I invite you to take some time to pray about how God is calling you to be good stewards of your gifts. Financial stewardship should not a burden we bear, but a joy in giving in the name of Jesus Christ in whom we have life.

On the 20th, we are blessed that the Rev. Dale Flowers from First Presbyterian Church in Santa Rosa will be leading worship and proclaiming the Word with us in our one blended worship service for the day at 10 a.m. It will be a day of celebration and joy, my friends! Come and see that the Lord is good! Let us covenant together to give of ourselves as we build for the future with Christ.

Describing what they learned from the mission trip this past summer, one student, Madison Eshoff, said this, "Before I began the mission trip to Santa Rosa, I had several expectations that I...was being called to change lives on this trip; however, one thing that I learned was that I didn't need those expectations to still make a difference. When each person's little acts of service and compassion are added together, collectively, they can have a significant impact on a community. God provided every human being with their own gifts and talents so that each person is able to serve others in different ways, and in turn, serve the Lord."

Each person has unique gifts and talents, and we are able to serve in important and varying ways. *Together*, we can make a significant impact on the church and community if every person is using their gifts for the glory of Christ in serving the church.

Imagine, though, for a moment, if some parts of your body weren't acting as if they were a part of your body. Imagine if your foot refused to be involved in the life of your body; if it wouldn't be involved in what it was designed for. It would just be dragged along, contributing nothing to the body, and actually would be hindering the body from walking as it should! How much better could the body move if the leg, and every body part, was moving and functioning as it was intended?

We all have a part to play in building the future here at PCN! We have *differing* gifts but, as Madison said, *collectively* we can have a significant impact in our church and in our world.

Paul said in 1 Corinthians 12:17, "If the whole body were an eye, where would be the sense of hearing? If the whole body were an ear, where would be the sense of smell?"

The fact that we have differing gifts is important. Do you know what your spiritual gifts are? If you do, how can you use those to bless this church and glorify God in the world? If you don't know your spiritual gifts, perhaps consider taking a Spiritual Gifts Test, many of which can be found online, or consider asking those close to you where they see you as especially gifted.

We are "the body of Christ and individually members of it" (1 Corinthians 12:27). In 1 Corinthians 13, after having just talked about spiritual gifts and the body, Paul focuses on the importance of love, and how that is most valuable of all. In 1 Corinthians 14:1 Paul says to, "[p]ursue love and earnestly desire the spiritual gifts." Pursue love! And desire the possession, use, and growth of spiritual gifts. Why? As Paul states many times in that chapter it is for the "building up of the church." Your gifts are to be used in building up the church!

God created us differently, uniquely, and we are united in Christ, as one body! Sometimes our body functions better, sometimes it functions worse; sometimes our body seems healthy, sometimes sick; sometimes there is unity in our body, sometimes great disfunction and conflict. How can you personally help the health of our body, as we move towards the future where God is leading us?

The Carr Fire burned 229,651 acres (359 square miles) in Shasta and Trinity counties starting on July 23, 2018. The fire started when a flat tire on a vehicle caused the rim to strike the asphalt creating a spark that set off the fire. Fed by strong winds, the fire jumped the Sacramento River, making its way into Redding. More than 38,000 people were evacuated, 1,077 homes were destroyed and eight people, died including three firefighters.

2019 Volunteer Teams

Volunteer teams will travel to Redding October 18-25, 2019 to rebuild lives working with *Hope City Response Network*, the same group we were with in Middletown the past three years. Individuals or groups may participate for the entire two weeks or just either the first or second week. There is a one-time fee of \$50 to cover team expenses. Transportation will be by personal vehicles and carpooling can be arranged.

Where Will We Stay?

Simpson Bible University has set aside a group of unoccupied student dorm rooms for our use. Each room accommodates four people in single (non-bunk) beds with one shared bathroom (cost per week per person is \$100). Three meals a day are provided by our team at one of the local churches (\$50 per week.) RV parking is being arranged (\$225 per week) or local motels are plentiful starting at \$60 per night.

Who can come?

Anyone over age 16 (youth 12 and older may work if accompanied by a parent). If you know the difference between a hammer and a potato peeler we have work for you. You do not have to have any particular skills, but there are some tasks in any construction project that may be strenuous or require specialized skills. The majority of tasks can be accomplished by anyone. Usually jobs are reduced to manageable tasks and good instruction is provided.

California Reentry Institute (CRI)'s Mission

Preparing men for and supporting them through transition from incarceration to freedom, assisting them in being contributing members of society. Proving that with preparation and support, the cycle of incarceration can be broken.



The Problem:

112,741 men in state prison in CA (CDCR Report midnight 7/17/19)
CDCR's annual budget is \$12.6 Billion (CDCR Budget Fiscal Year 2019-2020)
Cost to incarcerate an inmate \$81,203 (Legislative Analyst's Office 2018-2019)
2018 - 53,089 inmates released (CDCR monthly population archives)

70.8% – 2 year re-arrest rate 2018 (Public Policy Institute of California June 2018)

CRI By the Numbers:

4th Cohort with 68 participants started February 2019 at San Quentin State Prison 180 served inside San Quentin State Prison 57 served in the community - 22 of the men at our Reentry House 0 have gone on to recidivate!



Change begins on the inside:

Empowered Reentry Program (Pre Release)

CRI is the only CDCR sanctioned seamless Pre & Post Release program currently running at San Quentin State Prison. Our program is 18-24 months long. Classes, Processing Groups, Workshops and individual case management run weekly for a minimum of 4.5 hours.

Emotions

Tear down the emotional barriers and begin the path of recovery by addressing: Emotional Intelligence, Guilt & Shame, Criminal and Addictive Thinking, Trauma and much more.

Crime Impact Awareness

Through Victim Panels and loved ones of formerly incarcerated, plus six-months of intensive curriculum on the realities of Crimes of all types, in-depth discussion and homework on participants life, choices and decisions. We assist in understanding the causative factors of their crimes and the pain and suffering that they caused.

Life Skills & Case Management

Curriculum on Relationships; Education; Occupation; Finances; Technology; and Freedom Then What (realities of parole).

This is supplemented with Individual Case Management and creating a roadmap to a successful life.

And lasts a lifetime:

Post Release Program

Resources for Success: CRI greets our graduates at the gate upon release with a bag full of necessities such as a prepaid cellphone, bedding, clothing, wallet, toiletries, groceries and more. We provide assistance with obtaining all important documentation to start their new life.

Create Stability: CRI Understands that having a safe, stable place to return is of the utmost importance. Named after the founder's late husband, we offer our graduates free rent at Roland's House in Concord, CA upon release.

Support and Self Sufficiency: CRI assists graduates with obtaining employment, education and medical and parole needs. Following an individualized Service Plan we also help them establish a bank account, benefits and healthcare, etc.

Accounting for recidivism rates (70.8% vs 0%) CRI has saved the State (and taxpayers): \$3,219,537 per year

The benefits go beyond the dollar bill: Our clients have become leaders of change in the prison and contribute economically, socially, and philanthropically to the betterment of their communities across California!

YAV Update – Sierra Mink


I must begin with some sad news: Unfortunately, a week into the program, one of the three other BFJYAVs decided to leave. This was one of those times where I was struck by God's promise to turn all things to good. It would have been difficult to live with someone who was not as committed to the program and because she left so early, the three of us remaining have been able to reform as a stronger community. I am constantly amazed by how this small tragedy has been turned over and over again into a blessing.

This month I have been getting my feet wet with the different placements as well as with the programmatic demands of being a BFJYAV. I am at Eliot Presbyterian Church in Lowell every Sunday and Wednesday and work for the church remotely on Monday. My duties at the church include teaching Sunday School for the middle school-aged students; assisting in the teaching of the Confirmation Class; taking an active part in the Outreach Committee; leading the Youth Committee; and researching drop-in nursing ministry to get a program up and running at Eliot's coffee hour before church.

I have been loving getting to know the kids and community of Eliot Pres. I have been welcomed with such kindness that my feeling of belonging to this call to service has not been swayed, and I look forward to the many things God will do for me through others and for others through me. I also anticipate looking back on these first few weeks and seeing how God has been working long before I set foot in Lowell, Massachusetts.

Every Tuesday and Thursday I work at Living Waters a Center for Hope. This center is in a time of transition. Its mission is to help those who not only need the help but *want* the help. While breakfast is open to everyone, the workshops and services offered after 10 a.m. are for folks who are committed to bettering themselves. Beginning in October, the Living Waters staff and volunteers will be cracking down on this to be truly intentional about who and how they are aiding others. I am also doing an in-depth reflection on my blog (https://sierramink-bfjyav.weebly.com/) about the different services offered at the center.

The Boston Food Justice YAV Program is, of course, focused on food justice. We have been challenged to get ourselves onto SNAP (Supplemental Nutritious Assistance Program) and to buy food as local as possible. This challenge does not begin with looking for and buying food, though that is absolutely part of it. We must first jump through bureaucratic hoops and rigamarole to even be considered for the program. I will be writing another blog post to go up after I finish the series on Living Waters about my experience with the process. Finally, I will end this month with another big thank you to everyone who has and continues to support me. I have truly felt like a place was prepared for me here at Eliot and Living Waters, and I have the prayers of you all and God's fulfillment of those prayers to thank for such an amazing beginning to my Young Adult Volunteer year.

PCN Campus Development Q&A

Q: How did PCN get connected with Brown Consulting Group?

A: In the mid-2000's, a group was formed to study the feasibility of either renovating the CE building or building a new fellowship hall. With the economic downturn in 2008, discussion of a construction project was tabled. In 2017, a new group was formed with that same initial question top of mind, which ultimately led to soliciting bids from different firms to assess the cost of a new fellowship hall, repair of the CE building, and additional campus improvements. Three bidders presented, and the contract was awarded to Brown Church Development Group (https://www.churchdevelopment.net/). Their consulting framework begins with ministry development, which may or may not include physical campus development.

Q: What is Brown CDG doing for PCN?

A: Brown CDG's first deliverable to PCN was a study that identified factors limiting PCN's growth as well as identifying strengths of our ministry, with the goal of shaping our vision for the future. One of the key deliverables that Brown provides is a report called the "Growth Positioning Study" which provided PCN with several ministry action items. Another deliverable was an initial Architectural Program. The primary purpose of the Architectural Program was to assist PCN in assessing the feasibility of expanding and remodeling our facility.

Q: How are we paying for all of this?

A: The GPS was funded using the interest income generated within our endowment accounts. The Architectural Programming was funded through our Property Reserves.

Q: What are the recommended ministry action items?

A: Three key action items were identified: 1) Through an iterative process, involving a lot of feedback from our congregation, a mission and values statement will be drafted and presented to Session and to the congregation for review and approval; 2) our website will be overhauled; 3) communications within PCN will be more streamlined and accessible regarding all that we are doing regarding this

work. To that end, three subcommittees were commissioned to focus on each of these areas. If you are interested in becoming more involved in any of these areas, you would be most welcome! See Adam or Ariel.

Q: What are some of the recommended physical design elements?

A: Addressing traffic flow in and out of our parking lot as well as having sufficient parking that is safe and accessible; updating the landscaping to create natural "zones;" updating the CE building (repurposing/relocating classroom space, restroom renovations, improved signage, increasing accessibility); creating new relational space, potentially including a multi-use room, modular meeting rooms, a larger capacity kitchen, and designating areas that are child/youth focused.

Q: Do we have actual designs for all of that?

A: No, we do not. We have some conceptual diagrams only based on our expressed design goals: to be able to accommodate increased capacity for church gatherings; to create warm, accessible, comfortable and inviting spaces for <u>all</u> ages in order to worship, to learn, to play, and to have fellowship; to improve our "curb appeal;" to showcase our various ministries; to update and improve our technology; and to be well-positioned while we are Building for the Future.

Q: How would we be able to pay for all of that?

A: There are many possible avenues to pursue: embarking on a capital campaign, taking out loans, utilizing estate gifts, etc. Our Finance, Endowment, and Stewardship members are committed to studying these options (and more!) in depth. If you have an interest in creating a bequest or establishing a memorial gift, please contact the Stewardship and Endowment committees.

Q: What if I have more questions?

A: Please ask them. Adam and Ariel would be delighted to talk with you. We also have a number of people on the implementation team who are each working on the various sub-committees: Sally Carbonaro, Tonya Church, Diane Combs, Bekah Harmon, Tali Sundberg, and Bill Walker.

⁷ Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. ⁸ And God is able to bless you abundantly, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work. ⁹ As it is written:

"They have freely scattered their gifts to the poor; their righteousness endures forever." [a]

Exploring the Relationship Between Theology and Society

Introduction

Before the relationship between theology and society can be explored we have to define the scope and the definitions of theology and society. Using the methodology of deconstruction we understand that theology and society can be classified into different categories. These societies are both homogenous and heterogeneous with regard to religion and then by extension theology.

Premise

Contained within both societies are institutions. These institutions include businesses, governments, educational and religious facilities, NGO's, etc. These institutions influence the media and access to technology; therefore, they can control funding. Through the use of memes they are also able to control and influence the beliefs and by extension the definition of what is considered acceptable behavior of the individual(s) within a society.

Before we can speak intelligently about this topic, the relationship between theology and society must be understood. Within a homogenous religious society, the classical definition of theology (using the Bible as the primary source) influences the society. Within a heterogeneous religious society (such as the San Francisco Bay Area) the opposite is true: the collective beliefs of society are used to influence what is considered theology.

Think of the following dialog from Star Trek movie, The Wrath of Khan (1982):

"Logic clearly dictates that the needs of the many outweigh the needs of the few." Captain Kirk answers, "Or the one."

Hence, when we apply that quote from *Star Trek* to a heterogeneous religious society, the duality of meaning is thus implied and understood as such.

Summary

Therefore, the previously stated premise is what will be used to define the scope and discussion(s) of this group.

Next, a small barbecue pit was ceremoniously wheeled down the aisle to the front of the sanctuary. Representatives from deacons, session, UPW, Mariners, along with Pastor Rayment and former Pastor Pete Croughan, who was pastor when the mortgage was first taken out, all gathered around the small fire pot, each with a long stick match. The paid-off mortgage was dropped into the pot, and all helped to light it formally.

After that, there were lots of activities, including a 90's choir and a cake-cutting ceremony. A good and happy time was had by all present!
