# Building Up the Church: Pushing Past the "Me" and Toward the "We"

"Oh, I'm just here to be a consumer, pastor," said a young man as he sat in a new member class. "I've got time enough in my schedule to worship once in a while, maybe a Bible study, but that's about all. I need to be fed [spiritually], but I don't have time for doing anything. So keep them sermons coming!"

I get it. We all crave the sustenance that only God can provide: the heavenly manna that feeds and nourishes us in spiritual ways. I've seen it all too often in Christians new to their faith, excited and passionate to learn more about the grace of God in Jesus Christ. I've seen it in mature Christians who've made Bible study a spiritual discipline and who love and continue to seek to know the God they worship and serve.

But here's the rub: being fed spiritually, growing in relationship with Christ, should necessarily shape the praxis of our discipleship which, as the Apostle Paul suggests, includes "serving and building up the body of Christ" with all that God has equipped us with (Ephesians 4:11-13). God builds up and grows the Church when each individual in God's royal priesthood (1 Peter 2) matures in a faith that imitates Christ's sacrificial love (Ephesians 5).

In other words, being fed spiritually should lead to something – a way of life that begins to look more and more Christ-like: selfless, welcoming, inviting, reaching out, risk-taking, bold, courageous, and the list goes on and on.

But in a culture of rugged individualism and excessive consumerism Christian faith often gets watered down. It becomes a 'me and Jesus' faith that diminishes the centrality of the community. This kind of faith is marked by those who 'go' to

church to consume, to learn, to grow in knowledge and understanding, but only for what the church offers 'me.' The trouble is that if faith is simply about self-fulfillment – being fed spiritually – and is absent a heart for serving in and with the Body of Christ to be about God's mission, is it truly faith?

Perhaps this is what the book of James seeks to flesh out when it powerfully proclaims that "faith without works is dead" (James 2:26). Being 'fed' is not the end goal of a life of faith. Rather true faith is about being in relationship with the God who not only feeds us spiritually, but also transforms our lives to be more Christ-like "serving & building up the Body of Christ until we ALL reach the unity of faith and knowledge of God's son" (Ephesians 4:13).

True faith is about giving up the illusion of our own control and relinquishing it over to God. It's about being dependent on God and responsible to, and for, and with a community of faith, Christ's body, to share the good news and to make disciples of all nations.

Building for the future with God requires pushing past the temptation to just be about 'me,' and instead look beyond to the 'we.' It's about fully depending on God, seeing ourselves as a part of Christ's body that need each other, and seeing those in the world not as 'other' but as potential brothers and sisters with whom we're called and sent to share the good news, to love, and to lead to discipleship.

This kind of faith transforms congregations. They begin to show an abundant outpouring of compassion, kindness, love, invitation, welcome, and grace. They give, and give, and give of themselves not because they have to, but because their faith has transformed their lives so that they imitate Christ and Christ's love. And they do so not just for those they know, but especially for strangers, for visitors, for unknown neighbors, for the communities in which they reside, and beyond. Their faith is not simply internalized but is that of a community 'sent' to the world, for the world, by Jesus Christ to share good news that they cannot help but shout from the rooftops and share with their lives. They are passionate in their worship, extravagant in their generosity, risk-taking in their mission and evangelism, transformational in education leading to service and action, and equipping of the whole congregation to be about God's mission and vision for the church.

Oh, dear saints, such a church is light shining in the darkness, not hiding under a bushel basket, but sent out into the world to shine with grace and truth.

What might it mean for us to push past the 'me,' to submit to Jesus, and to embrace the 'we?' Perhaps this November we can each take some time to do a little self-reflection. What might it look like if I gave up control in my life to God, embraced my call as a part of a larger Body, and was about God's mission in, to, and for the world? What might I be doing differently at home? At work? At church? In the community? In my spare time? With my family? With my gifts? With my time?

Pray about it. Talk about it. Reflect on it. I know that's what this pastor will be doing in the month to come.

Several months ago, Pastor Adam and I wrote a song, a song that we felt was fitting for this church and for our present series about how we are "building for the future." The main concept of the song puts our church in the shoes of the Israelites, in the wilderness. God has told the Israelites about the place that He will direct them, to the promised land. But the people are, currently, in the wilderness. As a church, that's where we are, as we are discerning the promised land, the place God is directing us.

The wilderness can be hard at times. It's important to remember that God is not through with us, but is leading us, and directing us, to a new place.

Do you know the story of when some of the Israelites saw the promised land for the first time? God sent out spies, one from each of the twelve tribes, for forty days to see the promised land and report back to all of Israel. They came back having seen that it was a great land, that it flowed with milk and honey.

However, they also came back knowing that the people who dwelled in this land appeared strong. Caleb, one of the twelve, said "let us go up at once and occupy it, for we are well able to overcome it" (Numbers 13:30). Caleb and Joshua were the only two, of the twelve, that trusted in God, regardless of the apparent strength of their opposition. The others were scared. They forgot that it was God who had promised this land to them. They saw the people in the land, and were intimidated and scared, and thought the task was too much. So they came back from seeing the land, and lied to the people. They said the land was not good. And all the people of Israel were distraught.

It was ultimately the other ten's fear, which stemmed from their lack of trust in God, which propagated this lie. This faithlessness is ultimately what led God to keep the Israelites in the wilderness for forty years, one year for each day the spies viewed the promised land.

As we head towards the promised land, the place God is leading us as a church, there will be difficulty, there will be times of trial, there will be opposition.

Will you be a Caleb or one of the other ten?

Will you trust in God, and in the new place He is leading us as a church, or will fear keep you from seeing the promises of God?

If you're interested in reading Scripture to prepare your heart for this new season, I suggest reading the book of Haggai. Here is one excerpt from that book, referencing the building of the temple:

"Who is left among you who saw this house in its former glory? How do you see it now? Is it not as nothing in your sight? Be strong ... work for I am with you, declares the Lord of hosts, according to the covenant that I made with you when you came out of Egypt. My Spirit remains in your midst. Fear not ... the latter glory of this house shall be greater than the former, says the Lord of hosts. And in this place, I will give peace declares the Lord of hosts" (Haggai 2:3-5, 9).



### Lynwood Elementary Preschool and "Friday Learning Together" Programs

PCN is currently supporting the Lynwood staff and students in many effective ways. Besides being a designated line item in your PCN mission budget and the reading with students program, for which many of you volunteer for, we also support the preschool program as well as the "Learning Together" program for parents and their two- or three-year-old children. Both programs are places of trust, comfort, and safety where children are given the space to learn. These programs strengthen the neighborhood and encourage loyalty to the school, where many of these families later run the food pantry and volunteer in classrooms.

Learning Together is a program held every Friday from 9 to 11 a.m. in which multicultural families read, learn, and play together, in order to form an even firmer foundation for these young children when they enter preschool, either at Lynwood or another district school. PCN currently provides the salary for Learning Together. The preschool budget is paid through a grant. Budgets for both will be a subject of discussion come the end of the year, as plans are made for the 2020-2021 school year. Following are photos of the classroom.

### In Her Own Words A letter from Gilead House Mom, Erin

I experienced many years of homelessness before I moved to Gilead House. I was running from domestic violence and drug and alcohol abuse, trying my hardest to find a job and keep my daughter in school. I just couldn't make ends meet. Moving into Gilead gave me a chance at new opportunities. I cried when I saw we had our own bathroom and a safe place to call home.

Shortly after being at Gilead House, I had a pretty horrific health scare that resulted in me having to have blood transfusions. When I got out of the hospital I found out that I could not work until I got an expungement for a misdemeanor committed 10 years ago. Then my car broke down, leaving me with no way to attend school during the summer. I was almost back to square one. My Gilead House and AA family encouraged me as I just took life day by day.

### "I am determined to not let my past get the best of me."

A couple of months have passed and so much has changed! I worked with a lawyer and finally received the expungement and a working car. I have also found my calling in caring for seniors citizens! I've obtained my license and started nursing school at college of Marin. This was something I never could have even imagined without the support of Gilead house. My mentor, Gina, is just the icing on the cake she is amazing and reminds me that I am special and that I'm a great mom. She is my biggest cheerleader.

My daughter went from being a shy, scared, and untrusting little girl, literally hiding under the conference table, to performing in The Nutcracker. We have experienced amazing healing.

"I'm excited for what our future holds. I no longer have to worry about being somewhere safe and constantly looking over my shoulder."

Just because someone is homeless doesn't mean they are a bad person. I am just one example in a million. Sometimes we just need that extra hand to pull us back up to our feet. Life is so much more clear and achievable when you no longer have the worries and stress of being back on the streets without support and food in your belly.

Thank you for your support. There are no words to express our gratitude ... **thank you for life.**

### **Budgeting, Balancing and Building for the Future**

With Consecration Sunday having recently passed, the Finance and Administration Committee now begins the work of building the budget for the new year of 2020 and setting the tone for the next decade. It has been a great privilege of mine to witness the amazing generosity of our church. Before I get into our budgeting process, I want to tell you a brief story.

You may remember, or never forget, when my husband and I spoke about how we tithe. He actually said, "I almost fell over when I saw how much we should give." When Les and I discuss our pledge, we look at what we earn and almost never discuss how much we owe. We have found that when we tithe, we always have enough, and when we don't tithe, our money never makes it to the end of the bills, much less the end of the month. Our way of tithing goes back to early Biblical times. Our first example of tithing is Cain and Abel in the Bible. Abel brought the fat portions from some of the firstborn of his flock, and Cain brought some of the fruits of his labor. We know how the story goes with how God favorably accepted one offering over the other as well. You probably are wondering what that has to do with PCN. Here is the best part of the story.

PCN practices tithing in a similar way. Once we receive your pledges the Stewardship Committee calculates the total of all gifts. We then set aside a very small amount, so that we are able to stay within our means.

Now for the best part. Before we look at any other programs or funding changes, we calculate 25% off the top for mission giving. Our church has committed to very generously funding our mission program. We do not take what is left over – we offer it first. This has been a practice that has been kept sacred by the Finance and Administration Committee. We have managed to balance our budget every year and have been blessed to have some left over.

As we look to the year 2020, we are joyous about the future of our church. We challenged all committees to discover ways to save money in order for us to reallocate to emerging programs and needs. We are working on the following: updating our website, launching a PCN app for our phones, increasing funding for Program and Fellowship, and adjusting the funding as needed for all youth programs, which include Seekers and Vacation Bible School. This is how we are building for the future and making a significant investment in our community.

We hope that you are excited to pledge to our church as we look for what God is doing in our midst. Thank you so much for the gifts you have presented, and we look forward to showing you how this will launch PCN into a new decade.

Come and participate in the lively Bible discussion that we have on Sunday mornings at 9 a.m. in the library. We would love to have you join us!

In November we are going to examines Paul's instructions to the Corinthians and Thessalonians on how to live as faithful followers of Christ. First and 2 Peter teaches that faith requires holy living and goodness.

One of our lessons is "Faith That is Tested." The Corinthians were the moody adolescents of the early church. Their city was full of darkness, sin, and debauchery – all practiced out in the open, with little or no sense of shame. In the Corinthian culture, to participate in temple prostitution was not considered a violation of marital vows, so hundreds of people took advantage of the opportunity in a veiled expression of worship to a pagan god. Paul brought the Gospel to Corinth, and many who heard the Good News experienced saving faith and began their lifelong journeys of following Christ. But the vestiges of their old ways of living continued to haunt and influence them to the point where it was not only damaging the spiritual health of individual believers, but also the entire Body of Christ in that area. It was these areas of temptation that Paul addressed in his two letters to the Corinthians.


How do you respond to these questions?

- How do you feel when you hear that a fellow believer has fallen into serious sin?
- Why do we sometimes have an attitude of judgment first, rather than a desire to help encourage and restore the fallen believer?
- When have you seen a Christian forgiven and restored after their sin?

How quick we are to "jump" on others' sins without realizing how easily we slip into sin ourselves.

Come and join the discussion and understand how our obedience to God and His Word reflects His glory.


Before the sanctuary was built, when all took place in the "education" building, this was what we did. Can't date it exactly, but probably early 1970's.

Here's a recipe from one of the old Presbyterian cookbooks from the past when guests were coming "sometime" and you didn't know when you would be eating.

"Don't Know When They're Coming" Chicken Chicken pieces Crisco Chicken soup or clear broth

Line a 9x11 inch pan with foil. Rub chicken pieces with Crisco. Pack chicken pieces as tightly as possible. Pour soup or broth over chicken. Cover the entire pan with aluminum foil. Put in a slow oven for as many hours as needed. Before taking chicken out of oven, remove the aluminum foil so the top will brown.

Just think, you could put this in the oven before leaving for church and then dinner could be served whenever! And it was great even if you didn't have guests coming!
