"Come and See"

I don't know about you, dear saints, but Christmas is my favorite holiday!! On Thanksgiving Day I find myself scrolling the radio stations in the car looking for the Christmas music that begins to grace the airwaves. For me, it's a season of family and food, gifts and giving, music and celebration. But it's also like the dawning of something new, something profound, something that lightens the sky in the depths of a dark and cold winter, promising hope, renewal, and a bright tomorrow.

In the church, the anticipation of Christmas builds throughout the season of Advent as we gaze upon the horizon, hopeful, eager, waiting for the mystery that is to come. But I've never been one to simply gaze in awe sitting on my hands and knees while I wait for what I know is coming. No. And I don't think that's the message of Advent either.

Prepare. Get ready. God is about to do something new. This is the real Advent narrative. Don't keep the anticipation and hope to yourself. This new thing is for everyone! Shout it from the rooftops! Share the news with your family and friends. Invite your neighbors to "Come and See" this thing that God is up to, this light that is about to dawn, this gift that is for them just as much as it is for you.

Every Christmas my family would watch "A Charlie Brown Christmas." There comes that point in the movie where we hear Luke 2 shared with the viewers to tell us 'what Christmas is all about.' Angels appear to the shepherds to announce that Jesus has been born. It was always such a memorable scene to me; the heart of the Christmas season. It's not simply an announcement, but an invitation. It's news that invites you in, says, "this is about you too," and opens doors for communion, for unity. It's a bridge extended to the world. It's an irresistible invitation to "Come and See" this gift that is for you.

This Advent and Christmas season, I'd like to challenge you to extend the invitation of the season to your neighbors. We will be exploring the gifts of Christmas given to all people: hope, love, joy, and peace. This is a perfect time to invite your neighbors to 'come and see' what this light dawning in creation is all about.

The question is, how do you extend the invitation? Oh, I'm sure there are all sorts of well-thought out and meticulously fashioned techniques of persuasion out there...but the best invitation is the one that comes from the heart; one that shares a true desire to be in relationship with another person and that shares a passion and love for the church itself. It's less about persuasion and more about care and compassion for another person. It's about a genuine invitation to "come and see;" "come and check it out, this church that I love and that changes my life through Christ."

Perhaps just mustering up the courage to ask another person to come to church is all it takes, and then showing that you are thrilled when they do visit – maybe sitting with them, inviting them to lunch after, getting to know them better in the days to come, praying for them, following up with them in the days and weeks and months to come. Love is the heart of invitation and welcome, love that goes out of its way to share with others the message that, 'this is your home too.' 'You belong.' Here, in this community of faith, you can experience the gifts of Christmas all the time.

Blessings to you, dear saints, this Advent and Christmas season! I challenge each of you to extend an invitation to "Come and See" what's going on in our congregation to your family, friends, and neighbors as we journey together. Do so with a heart of love and grace, meeting people where they are. Who knows what God might do through you!

At the age of fifteen, I was a fitness guru. When I wasn't in the weight room, I was exercising and doing push-ups on my own. I was constantly creating new fitness plans. That's what I loved doing. That's what I was all about. In future years, as that slowed, what I realized is that my muscles didn't remain at the level that they had been – they started to atrophy. When I wasn't exercising, my muscles were atrophying.

Similarly, our relationship with Christ is either growing or it's atrophying – it's never staying the same.

Either Christ is at the forefront of our thoughts, or he isn't. Either Christ is becoming more the center of our lives, or he is being moved to the periphery, while something or someone else is moving towards the center.

Has your relationship with Jesus been growing recently? Has your intimacy with Him grown deeper? If not, then chances are your relationship with him has been atrophying.

If we are in a season of complacency with Christ, or in a season of half-hearted pursuit, a season of atrophy, what do we do to grow, to get back on track?

In Ephesians 3, Paul is explaining his prayer for the Ephesian church, and he is praying that "...[God] may strengthen you with power through his Spirit in your inner being, so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith. And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge – that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God" (Ephesians 3:15-19).

Paul's prayer is that the Christians in Ephesus would grasp the love of Christ, in a richer sense. If we are in a stale season with Christ, we need to ponder and meditate on the wonders of the Gospel.

Paul prays that they would grasp the width of the love of Christ. Do you know the breadth or width of Christ's love? What is the width of his love? We see this dimension in the book of Revelation, where the depth of Christ's love is shown to us. Revelation 5:9 says of Christ that "because you were slain, and with your blood you purchased for God persons from every tribe and language and people

and nation." The beauty of the width of the love of Christ is that Christ's love is wide enough for every nation, wide enough for every people group, wide enough for every language and tribe. Meditate on that. This is the beauty of the width of Christ's love.

Paul prays that the people would grasp the length of the love of Christ. Do you realize the length of Jesus' love? Do you understand that the length of his love is from eternity to eternity? His love began before time, before anything had been made. His love will continue forever and ever. There has been no beginning to the love of Christ, and there will be no end to it. What was God doing before he created the world? 1. He was loving Himself (The Trinity) 2. He was loving his people (election). Meditating on the length of Christ's love helps us remember that his love is always there, it always has been, and always will be. Jeremiah 31:3 reminds us that "the Lord appeared to us in the past, saying: 'I have loved you with an everlasting love; I have drawn you with unfailing kindness.'" Think about the beauty of the length of the love of Christ.

Paul prays that the Ephesians would grasp the height of the love of Christ. Perhaps Paul has in his mind the place, the height, to which Christ's love will ultimately take us. That Christ died to take away our sin, to bring us to the place of union with God. We are given his righteousness; we are given his spirit; we are adopted into his family; we are given a new nature. We are brought to the place of being united with God, both now and in Heaven. This is the height of the love of Christ, rising all the way to Heaven. Think about the beauty of the height of his love.

Lastly, Paul prays that they may grasp the depth of the love of Christ. What is this depth? In the depth of the love of Christ, we see the depths to which Christ went to save us. *Read Philippians, chapter 2*. We see that Christ was, in his very nature, God. And yet did not consider that to be something to hold too tightly onto, but descended to this broken, fallen, and sinful Earth. He descended to becoming a human. He did not stop becoming what he always was (God). But he became something that he wasn't before (a human). Not only that, but he descended further: he not only came into this world as a human, but he came into this world meagerly. He did not come as a king, but as a servant. He did not come with riches, though all the world was his, but he came in poverty. Not only that, but he willingly died. Though Christ made all things, and was ultimately over all things, he allowed himself to die for the sin of his people. He humbly came, and humbly went to the cross. Why? To save his people. He allowed people to falsely accuse him, and in humility, he did not respond. He was mocked, and ridiculed, and he

endured it all, because there was something deeper going on, there was a deeper purpose behind it all, namely *your salvation*. Christ came, and went to the cross, and he did it with joy (Hebrews 12:2) because he knew that this was necessary for you and me to be saved. That was his goal, that was his purpose, that was the depth to which his love descended. Meditate on the depth of Christ's love for you.

My prayer for you is the same: that God may strengthen you with power through his Spirit in your inner being, so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith. And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God.

When we realize the width, the length, the height, and the depth of the love of Christ for us, it can't lead to complacency. As we meditate on the love of God for us, may it, in turn, cause our love for Him to grow.

BUILDING OUR FOUNDATION FOR THE FUTURE -UPDATE

Way back in early September we, the congregation of PCN, commissioned three teams to faithful service: a mission/vision team, a communication team, and a website team. Each was tasked with a unique mission to help our church understand, articulate, and/or live into God's call for us as God 'Builds for the Future' in our midst. This is indeed important work on your behalf and requires no small amount of time and commitment, prayer, research, and a lot of listening both to God and to you, the congregation.

So you might be wondering, "Where are we in our 'Building our Foundation for the Future?"

Your long-awaited update is here!

The **Mission/Vision Team** (Michael Winsor [moderator], Kay Walker, Don Brand, Tali Sundberg, Walt Campbell, Sally Carbonaro, and Adam Smith) was commissioned to specifically fashion PCN's Mission, Vision, and Values statements.

- This team has met, on average, every week-and-a-half since the end of August.
- We have met almost a dozen times to date.
- We have: a) poured over the 2017 PCN Mission Study, b) delved into Scripture to reflect on the
 heart of discipleship, c) met with small groups of the church and had one-on-one dialogue with
 church members, and d) listened to and prayed for the Holy Spirit's guidance in our work. We
 have done this to gather information about both who we are (our identity) and where God is
 leading us (our call).

This team, having spent two and a half months listening to God and to you, the congregation, is now beginning to fashion the rough drafts for our Mission, Vision, and Values statements.

WHAT HAPPENS ONCE THE FIRST DRAFTS OF STATEMENTS ARE WRITTEN?

Once these statements are written, they will go to Session for discussion and eventual approval. It is our plan to share the statements with the congregation in January with plenty of time for you to read through them, ask questions, and dialogue about them before we vote to adopt them at our annual congregational meeting on January 26th.

WHAT CAN I DO TO HELP?

members. We would love to chat with you. This work is, after all, being done on your behalf and is always open to conversation. We know the Holy Spirit is working through each of us in this process.

ONCE THE STATEMENTS ARE VOTED ON AND APPROVED BY THE CONGREGATION, THEN WHAT?

Once the statements have been voted on by the congregation – statements that reflect our unique identity and call from God – then the Session will have these new tools to help us reflect on and guide our life and ministry together. These statements will help us articulate to the community who we are and what we do. We will be able to develop our website to better reflect our congregation and our mission. We will be able to better assess our facility needs and priorities. In essence, we will have a foundation, fashioned in faithful prayer and discernment, centered on Jesus Christ, on which to build with God for the future.

For some of us, this might sound a little frightening. It sounds like it might lead to some kind of 'change' in the long run, and change is always scary. But here's the thing: these statements will not change who we are at PCN. They will not make us into something that we are not. These statements will succinctly reflect who we are and who God calls us to be. At times they will affirm what we're doing. At other times, they'll challenge us and our way of doing things. They will cause us to question 'why' we do certain things. They will give us direction in our life and ministry.

This really and truly is an exciting time at PCN as we continue to discern together. I am humbled to be a part of it with you and am filled with hope as I think about what God is up to in our midst; because in Christ, we know that God is always about renewal and new life!

Balancing, Budgeting and Building for the Future - Part II

Commuting for me is almost second nature and driving well over a hundred miles a day is "normal." The other day as I contemplated what I was going to write, I realized that I was merely "going with the flow of traffic" and several exits passed me by. I am so familiar with Interstate 80 that Costco gas stations and Starbucks are known locations no matter what direction I go. This familiarity can bring on a kind of numbness or mindlessness, as the road stretches out before me and the signs go by.

Each year the Finance and Administration Committee is challenged to create a budget that is balanced, covers all the cost increases from year to year, but still makes room for new expenses. At our last meeting we had a mission, but before we got started, we spent time reading and contemplating verses from Scripture about money, tithing and stewardship. Stewardship is not just about giving money, but also about taking special care of every dollar pledged.

We looked at most of the services we use, and then took a deep dive to uncover different aspects. These aspects were discussed so we understood the effects of the changes. I am thankful for the wisdom expressed during these conversations. You might be asking why would we do this? We want to make sure that we use the gifts you pledge on things that have added value for the ministry of PCN with a heavenward perspective. This kind of evaluation continues long after the meeting adjourns.

In our quest for balance we are learning when to move forward, how fast to move forward and the best direction to move. We asked the committees to take a deep dive into each line item, and this applied to our committee as well. As we look forward to building for the future, a stronger, leaner budget makes sure that we can support the ministries on a firm foundation without wavering in our commitment to support mission work here in Novato and beyond. Thank you for your continued generosity as we are very excited to see how God uses the gifts we give back in the upcoming year.


Treats for Coffee Hour


We have been looking forward to having you join us on Sunday mornings. Come and join in on the lively discussion and the time of fellowship with each other.
