Discernment Team UPDATE!

It has been three months since the PCN Discernment team (tasked with fashioning a new ministry, leadership, and staffing structure in alignment with our call as a congregation [a.k.a. Mission, Vision, Values]), and the team has been hard at work on your behalf.

One of our goals throughout this process has been to be transparent in what the team is working on and to include you, the congregation, in the work that is being done. Afterall, this is our work together.

The team has, to this point:

- Met six times, with three of those meetings being 3+ hours each.
- We have prayed and reflected on Scripture in each meeting.
- We have reflected on PCN's call and 'dreamed' about what PCN might look like in the future should we live into our vision.
- As we honed a collaborative, articulated picture, we began to bring into our conversation the Growth Positioning Study created by Brown Church Development. This included results from a survey PCN took a few years ago, statistical data for Marin and Novato, and recommendations for PCN. We also brought into our conversation notes from PCN's officer retreat in April 2020.
- We took a SWOT analysis of our congregation (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Challenges) and did some critical reflection of our organization.
- With all this data, we began to compile a list of ministry priorities centered on PCN's call.

We are now working to fashion a ministry structure that best supports our call and context as a church.

The team will be meeting the next few Saturdays (February 27 and March 6) to finish up the first draft of our ministry, leadership, and staffing structure. Our work will then go to Session for review and discussion at the March Session meeting before going back to the Discernment Team for editing.

At this point (late March) we will need your input!! While we have not yet decided what the format will be (survey, virtual town hall, or other) you will all have a chance to add

input and join the discernment. The information the team receives from you will add to the finalization of the new structure which we hope to have approved for implementation by June.

Wheewww...for Presbyterians...this is a FAST process!! Believe me, I know. But, from what I've come to learn from you at PCN, and from where we stand right now as a congregation (in the middle of transition with staffing turnover, a lingering pandemic, and the like), we are ready to see what God has in store for us in this new season. We are ready to make a prayerful, hopeful change. We are ready to trust the Holy Spirit and lean on God more as we move through 2021 and beyond.

Blessings to you, dear saints. May we journey together in this year of transformation.

Because Water is Life

When Manuel Nazario casts his net into the water these days, his catch is far less plentiful. In the remote area of Bolivia near the Paraguay-Argentina border, Manuel and the members of his indigenous community are finding that fishing, their traditional livelihood, is now in severe jeopardy.

The Capirendita (pronounced CAP-IR-EN-DITA) community is grappling with the devastating impact of climate change, irregular rainfall patterns, prolonged droughts, disease and mining pollution. As a result, their age-old ways of life and their means of economic support are increasingly threatened. The degradation of the environment and the mounting lack of access to water threatens their very survival.

Manuel has emerged as one of the leaders in his fishing community. A born innovator and community organizer, he is now leading the families in Capirendita toward the promise of a better way, in partnership with a local organization called CERDET (<u>Center for Regional Studies of Tarija</u>). Together they are working to develop irrigation systems and to collect and store rainwater for safe drinking.

Because of gifts received through One Great Hour of Sharing, like the gifts you and I will make to this offering here in our congregation, CERDET is building infrastructure to address the communities' critical water shortage. Their goal is to create 500 meters of pipes to transport safe well water to those in need. Manuel will be responsible for carrying out the excavation work on the underground piping system. Our gifts will also support the distribution of plastic containers to collect and save rainwater.

One Great Hour of Sharing helps us address critical water needs in places like South Sudan, training technicians to dig water wells for their communities and on maintenance, hygiene and sanitation. And in places like Detroit, our gifts have joined We the People of Detroit to secure access to water for those who have had their water shut off during the pandemic. Imagine not being able to wash anything during the pandemic!

One Great Hour of Sharing is the single, largest way that Presbyterians come together every year to share God's love by becoming "repairers of the breach," joining with people in need to build

God's house, together. Together we are making a better world for those in need no matter where they are. Please give generously, for when we all do a little, it adds up to a lot.

Let us pray ~

Meet all the needs for which the world thirsts, O God. May your spring of justice, compassion and peace spring up quickly, and may it spring up quickly in us. Amen.

A Letter from Ryan and Alethia White, serving in the Iranian Presbyterian Church in Berlin


Dear friends,

Although Germany is again in strict lockdown mode since before Christmas, we have been no less busy in the last weeks. The new year began at full speed as Ryan helped prepare, with a partner organization, *Gemeinsam für Berlin* (Together for Berlin), to hold a prayer event to mirror similar events held by churches throughout Germany and Europe. A week of "Prayer for Christian Unity" has been a yearly event backed by the World Council of Churches since the 1980s, and this year seemed especially important as churches around the world are working hard to maintain a sense of community amidst the isolation of the pandemic and also are reaching out in innovative ways to help people facing mass migration, poverty, and injustice. A pause for prayer in the midst of these challenges was and is still needed. The program here in Berlin was originally going to be in-person at the famed Berliner Dom church, but because of the current restrictions was moved to a digital format with Ryan in charge of the technicalities. Only a small group facilitated the event inside the Dom and the participants joined virtually. Overall, it went well!

Alethia recently took part in a PC(USA) webinar on the subject of the migration crisis in southern Europe. The webinar was hosted by Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, World Mission, and the Office of Public Witness and featured three presenters from Italy and Greece. Efi Latsoudi from Lesvos Solidarity in Greece was someone whose insight we were quite impressed by when we participated in the Europe and Middle East regional gathering in Lesvos, Greece in 2019, so it was a pleasure to hear an update from her about the current situation on the island. 

Supporting Cents-Ability (formerly Two Cents A Meal)

Have you missed the little box in the Narthex labeled Two Cents A Meal? That box faithfully appeared each month at Communion to collect donations for the Presbytery Hunger Program. Well, just like everything else, that box has now gone virtual. This means that you and I can still "drop in" our donations via the online giving page. Just select the Two Cents A Meal Presbytery Hunger Fund online or mail or drop off a check to the church office. Just be sure to note your check is for "Two Cents A Meal."

What is Cents-Ability and why did its name change?

Cents-Ability originated in 1976 as "Two Cents A Meal," a project begun by Presbyterian Women to involve individuals and families in a corporate response to world hunger. Over the years, presbyteries have developed similar programs entitled Pennies for Hunger, Nickle-A-Meal, etc. The name Cents-Ability merely brings all these programs under one umbrella.

In the Presbytery of the Redwoods, your Cents-Ability donations enable churches all the way from Humboldt County to Marin to feed the hungry through food pantries, community gardens, meal programs and much more. In 2020, the \$21,925 in donations received by Cents-Ability was awarded to 18 grant recipients. A couple of local examples of these awards include a Napa church community garden and the Extra Food program. With nearly one in four households experiencing food insecurity, every dollar donated to Cents-Ability helps sustain someone in their time of need. Please give as generously as you are able and thank you.

- The Discernment Team continues to work to evaluate PCN resources and staffing in light of where God is leading PCN.
- Program & Fellowship will host bingo in 2021 as well as monthly Litter Bee clean-up on the first Saturday of the month at PCN.

Reconvening Task Force Update

The Reconvening Task Force met for the first time in 2021 on January 14. We discussed where we are regarding returning to in-person worship and opportunities for fellowship together at the church. We are working on preparing for indoor worship, preparing for outdoor services, and gathering information on changes to state guidelines on reopening. We will be meeting as needed to make sure we are ready when it is safe to return to indoor services. While we wait for indoor services, we will be able to meet outdoors and several outdoor chapel services are scheduled. For the outdoor services we will follow all guidelines and requirements for outdoor services. The requirements include limiting the number of people that attend to around 40 people to allow for appropriate distancing. Please reserve your spot ahead of time by making a reservation. Masks are required and seating will be set up to allow social distancing of family groups.

Other items we are working on include tracking supplies for ongoing operations and identifying how groups can start to meet safely outdoors and indoors. The vaccines are starting to become available, and we anticipate that there will be a time when some of us are vaccinated while many are still waiting. Planning for this time, identifying when we can meet, and what it might look like may be challenging.
