"The Gift of Unhurried Time"

I once had a mentor share with me a tidbit of wisdom that I want to pass on to others. This advice was given from one pastor to another, but I think its relevance goes beyond pastoral ministry.

He advised me, "Adam, when you are ordained into your first call as a pastor, don't fill up your schedule. Leave a lot of open space and open time. Busyness and productivity kill pastors."

At the time, I had no idea what he meant. But as I jumped into ministry, it became all too clear.

I think, in a sense, we all tend to internalize this capitalistic spirit within ourselves (even pastors). This idea of busyness equaling productivity; rest being for the lazy and being a waste of time; worth being about producing and results. In fact, it can be so ingrained within us that when we finally have that time off that we need and long for, we can feel like we're wasting time if we just sit and watch TV or take a nap. We can't just ... be.

What I noticed is that whenever I filled up my schedule to the brim, full of productive meetings, visits, study, and writing, it also sucked me dry. My ministry got stagnant, not just for me, but for the church I served. Sure, the Session and Personnel Committee thought I was doing an amazing job, working so many hours, visiting so many people, writing well-researched sermons, living out my job description. But what they missed was how much it wore me down, zapping my energy and creativity, and turning ministry into just another job to do.

But the biggest consequence of this capitalistic spirit was that it didn't lead to church growth and church health as one would assume (work leading to results). Instead it led to a stagnant and sterile ministry. Sure, people were happy with the way things were, with the constant visitation, with the 'great' sermons, but there was no room for the Holy Spirit; no room to stop, breathe, and reflect.

What was missing was 'unhurried time;' what might be considered wasteful time to some. Time to experiment, to reflect, to not have to run from one thing to the next. To

have adequate time to process events, reflect on them, cultivate new ideas and ministry endeavors; time to listen to the Holy Spirit.

By unhurried time, I'm not talking about Sabbath. Sabbath is the opposite of work, it's rest. I'm talking about time that's purposefully unscheduled with appointments and things to do and left open for listening; listening that might lead to actions or endeavors.

In my life as a pastor, I've found that busyness and seeing as wasteful anything that is unproductive is to the detriment of being the church. Too often, it closes out the Holy Spirit. It doesn't leave room for a relationship with God where God is in the lead but assumes that our hard work will produce God's warranted results.

It's time to rethink this capitalistic spirit that we too often internalize and to learn to value and embrace 'unhurried time.' It's not wasteful, it's faithful. It's not unproductive, it's time to listen to God and to the world around us, allowing God to take the reigns for a change.

So, dear saints, what do you think? Is this advice worth spreading? For me, it has been life-saving advice, and I hope it can be for you too.



On Sunday morning at 8 a.m. the adult Bible study class meets on Zoom. We send out an agenda and it will have the Zoom link on it.

We have a **lively Bible study discussion**. **That's what happens here**. As adults study the Bible and discuss what they found during the week in the lesson, they gain a growing understanding of how to move forward on their discipleship journey.

In the class, we read the Scripture and then focus on the passage. Easy week we're challenged to prepare for the next week's lesson. The preparation isn't long or difficult, but it does encourage participation. When adults have invested something of themselves in the lesson they get more out of it.

The biggest part of the lesson doesn't happen in class. It happens on Monday and Tuesday – and through the week – when instead of following their own desires or the crowd, they dare to say, "No, I will follow Jesus."

In the month of May we will be concentrating on "Courageous Prophets of Change" using several books of the Old Testament: 1 Kings, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, and Jonah. These five bold prophets show that when people strayed from their covenant with God, the prophets called them back.
