Yet, as you read through our vision, you will see that this form of 'connecting,' as modeled in the radical love of Jesus, takes shape in some new, intentional, and life-giving ways.

I am excited about the days to come, my friends. And I am excited that we will be a part of this vision together.

Novato COVID Response and Recovery Team



Did you know PCN is a partner in the Novato COVID Response and Recovery Team?

This important group in Novato includes North Marin Community Services, City of Novato (including Novato Police), Novato Unified School District and the Novato Fire Department. We work together with County of Marin to respond to the COVID disaster, get our community vaccinated and make Novato a safe place to be!

We hosted two vaccination clinics in late July and early August with County of Marin. Nearly 70 people were vaccinated here. However, our neighborhood, called Census Tract 1032, is far behind. Only 77% of people living in this area (roughly Wilson to Indian Valley and around to Novato Boulevard) is vaccinated. That is more than 1,400 people of the 6,159 Novato residents still not vaccinated. The unvaccinated tend to be between 50 and 65 (data as of 9/14/21).

You can help. You can talk to your neighbors. You can direct them to the County of Marin's website <u>https://coronavirus.marinhhs.org/vaccinefinder</u>. You can ask them why they are not vaccinated and point them to the facts and myths of vaccination at <u>https://coronavirus.marinhhs.org/faq/topic/145</u>. On the other hand, you can simply implore them to talk to their own doctor. Do this out of love and care. The county has reached 90% fully immunized people, more than 201,000 people. Help our community and our country to be safe!

In future months there will be more to come about how to stay safe from wildfires and learn how PCN is an active member in the community responding to these disasters and helping prepare. A letter from NMCS regarding our Pentecost Offering donations to their mental health services



September is Suicide Prevention Awareness Month. Let's join hands and lift up hope – to reduce the stigma associated with accessing mental health services and raise awareness of suicide prevention.

We can all play a role in prevention. Suicide is a public health issue that devastates families, friends and communities. It remains the second leading cause of death among U.S. teenagers, and rates of youth suicide and self-injury hospitalization are on the rise, especially among younger adolescents (<u>Kids Data</u>). Marin County has among the highest suicide rates in the Bay Area. Although the majority of people who have depression do not die by suicide, having major depression does increase suicide risk compared to people without depression (<u>HHS.gov</u>). In 2019, youth depression in Marin County was 36%, up from 30% in 2016, and higher than the statewide average of 32% (<u>Healthy Marin</u>). NMCS Director of Wellness Programs, Alaina Cantor, LCSW, shares, "We have seen a rise in the demand for mental health services. Over the past year, NMCS clinicians supported 800 people with therapy primarily through virtual or telemental health services.

"Fortunately, we are now able to increase our onsite services in partnership with NUSD school campuses, at the Novato Teen Clinic and hear at our 680 Wilson Avenue center. With increased demand, we have also onboarded nine new clinicians and two new clinical supervisors. We will be able to continue to offer both in-person and telemental health care in our community. As more people struggle with the impacts of trauma and prolonged stress, we have trained all our staff in trauma-informed care and risk assessment, so they are able to screen for suicidal ideation (thoughts) which can affect anyone regardless of age, gender or background."

Suicide survivors, the people who have lost a loved one to suicide, are often left with complex and traumatic grief, and fortunately there is support and tools available in our community: <u>National Suicide</u> <u>Prevention Lifeline</u> and <u>Survivors of Suicide (SOS) Peer Support Group – Buckelew Programs</u>.

It is necessary for our reading of 1-2 Samuel to remember that the concept of covenant became Israel's most important and pervasive relational metaphor in the Old Testament. This became the best way to describe Israel's relationship with God, who is thereby portrayed as the Great King and Israel as the weaker vassal. From Israel's earliest recollection of national origins (the Mosaic covenant) and in its greatest theological explanation of its relationship with God, God most often assumed the position of King of Israel.
