### "The Agile Church"

"The central challenge facing churches today is rediscovering who they are in a society that has in many ways rejected Christianity. Christian community cannot be assumed; it must be cultivated intentionally, both within established congregations and with new neighbors" (Zscheile, Dwight, The Agile Church).

One of the ordination questions in the Presbyterian Church USA in which all Elders, Deacons, and Ministers of Word and Sacrament affirm reads, "Do you promise to serve the congregation with energy, intelligence, imagination, and love?" The word that I always get hung up on is the word "imagination." Why is this included? Where does it come from? What purpose does it serve and to what are our officers committing?

The word seems to imply something more than just being shrewd, more than careful and reasoned planning and discernment, something beyond maintaining the status quo and managing well. It implies dreaming and wondering, being creative and open-minded, thinking outside the box and beyond 'the way things have always been done.' 'Imagination' stirs up images of a child playing with her toys, inventors dreaming up preposterous things like flying machines, trips into outer space, and mobile telephones; innovations like vaccines, modern psychotherapy, and online worship.

When we think of church, we don't often think of the word 'innovation' do we? We don't think of words like agile, nimble, or flexible. We think of words like immutable, sturdy, and unchanging.

But our call to 'share the gospel' and 'make disciples' is truly a call to innovation, creativity, and imagination, is it not? The culture and the world around the Church changes. Methods and ways of fulfilling our mission, by necessity, have to change too as we work to make accessible the good news at the heart of our faith. It's not that the good news changes, but that our job as gospel-sharers is that of interpreter and translator, sharing good news in the language of our contemporary culture.

It is not that we are supposed to throw out the best of who we are – our worship, our sacraments, our prayers, and the like – in order to do this, instead it's being able to adapt and modify those elements so they continue to orient us toward our Lord and Savior in community, but also so that they include others from outside. When our ancient Israelite brothers and sisters were forced into exile, they found ways to retain the best of their identity, their stories, their rituals, their scriptures, and yet they found ways of being faithful in the changing world around them.

Looking around the landscape of western Christianity, it is evident that being able to be agile and nimble as well as imaginative and innovative are necessary pieces of living out our mission. It's not a contemporary notion, but an ancient one that perhaps we are called to reclaim.

# All Dressed Up Ministry Update 2022

The All Dressed Up Ministry was started in 2011 to support the California Re-entry Program (CRP) by providing clothing for inmates in San Quentin State Prison who are being paroled or released from incarceration to re-enter society. Many of you may already know about this ministry, and there are probably some who have never heard of it. Hopefully, this short write-up will give you an understanding of this valuable mission.

The California Re-entry Program is a program in San Quentin that provides guidance and counseling to help inmates transition to society after being released from prison. The program is a volunteer program that meets at San Quentin to assist inmates with the needs they have in preparation for release. The volunteers work with the inmates to help with their needs such as obtaining an ID, locating transitional housing, processing forms for SSI, job applications, and other items that we take for granted. When the inmates are released, the program provides transportation for them if needed to get to their final destinations.

One of the support tasks that CRP provides is supplying the inmate with what is called 'dressout' clothing to wear when they are released. Normally, dressout clothing is sent to the inmate by friends or family on the outside of the prison. In many cases, the inmates do not have family or friends who are willing or able to provide them with clothing. If the inmate does not receive any clothing from outside the prison, they are required to purchase the clothing from the prison.

The clothing provided by the prison is medical scrubs, and the inmate is charged \$37. The All Dressed Up Ministry receives clothing requests from CRP for the prisoners prior to their release. On or about the 15<sup>th</sup> of each month, the All Dressed Up Ministry gathers the clothing (currently stored in the shed behind the nursery) for inmates who

are scheduled for release in the upcoming month, boxes the clothing, and mails it to the prison to be stored in the warehouse until the inmate is released.

Additionally, a notification card is sent to the inmate to notify them that the clothing is available for them to pick up when they are released. Here is an example of the notification card.

#### Dear

A package containing clothes for you has been sent to San Quentin. Please ask for it when you are released. These clothes are provided as part of the "All Dressed Up" ministry at the Presbyterian Church of Novato (PCN). If you are in the area, we invite you to visit PCN. Our church services are Sunday at 10 a.m. in-person or online at <a href="mailto:pcnovato.org">pcnovato.org</a>. We hope these clothes help as you move on after prison.

NOTE: Please do not pass this letter along to other inmates. We receive all our requests for clothing through CRP.

Occasionally, we receive thank you letters from the inmates expressing appreciation for the clothing. The letters convey a deep appreciation for what we send. It is easy see how much the clothing means to the inmate.

This ministry has sent more than 1000 boxes of clothing to the inmates being released since 2011. Last year we sent 81 boxes. There has recently been an increase in the number of boxes sent because of an increase in the number of inmates being released. In the last three months, we have sent 51 boxes of dressouts.

This ministry couldn't be possible without the valuable support of the congregation. Over the past years, the congregation has donated almost all of the clothing that has been delivered to the inmates. The All Dressed Up Ministry and the inmates are grateful for all the donations for this program.

Currently, the inventory of clothing is getting low. We need the following items.

- Pants preferably jeans. Waist sizes 40" and larger with length of 30" and longer
- Shoes sizes 8 to 12
- Windbreakers sizes XL and larger
- Sweatshirts and hoodies sizes XL and larger
- Shirts sizes XL and larger

We try to send only durable clothing to the inmates because many of them end up on the streets. They need clothing that will keep them warm and will last for some time under street conditions. We do not take suits or sport jackets because they are not durable, and we can't get the proper measurements for dress clothing.

If you have any of these clothing items that you would like to donate, please bring them to the church office or contact Mike Robinson at 415-302-1729 for assistance. Also, if you would like to help with the boxing and delivery of the clothing for the inmates, please let Mike know as well.


#### A MESSAGE FROM YOUR NEW FINANCE & ADMINISTRATION ELDER – Brad Praun



**Per Capita Apportionment** 

#### What is the Per Capita apportionment?

Each year the Presbyterian Church (USA) establishes a per capita apportionment. When we pay our per capita, we are helping to support the structures that support us as a congregation: the Presbytery, the Synod, and the General Assembly. These councils of the church consult with our elders and pastor(s) on all aspects of church life, bring us together with other congregations to grow in faith and do mission, sponsor projects to show Jesus' love all over the world, and help us manage our programs, finances, and buildings. In 2022, each congregation in Redwoods Presbytery will receive a bill charging \$34.00 for each active member. Of that amount, \$8.98 goes to the General Assembly, \$5.22 to the Synod of the Pacific, and \$19.80 to the Presbytery of the Redwoods. If you are able, please prayerfully consider paying this per capita apportionment in addition to your regular giving. It will help with our church budget!



The Christian Education committee is sponsoring a new spring 2022 adult learning opportunity: "Reading Biblical Literature," a free series of 36 video lectures via Zoom that present scripture from Genesis to Revelation as literature. Weekly sessions will cover two lectures and include discussion led by PCN elders Ellen Breazeale and Walt Campbell. I will miss being in the office and talking to and seeing all the wonderful members of this church. Please pray that God will lead me to discern His will in what for me is a life-changing decision.



They are written for us in Scripture, where we not only read the laws themselves but also learn how they were given and how life worked out for people in the past when they lived by the laws ... and when they didn't! That historical record is good to both understand God's law and to apply it daily so we give and get justice in our lives.




