### **Resurrection Life**

As we march into Easter and the season of resurrection in the church year, I've thought long and hard about the season that PCN is in. The end of the pandemic is in sight. The total vaccination percentage in Marin County is above 50% as I write this article. We are now in the yellow tier with the option of beginning onsite church activities. The Reconvening Task Force is now working to create a timeline for when we will return onsite.

#### Resurrection indeed!

But a return to onsite worship and in-person activities, as life-giving as that will be for our congregation, will only be the beginning of living into our vision as God's church here in Novato. The pandemic did more than cause us to go 'virtual' for church life, it also revealed things about us as a congregation...our capacity for resilience, improvisation, creativity, caregiving, and our strengths for ministry. Yet it also revealed our gaps, our needs, our fears, our desires for the future. In this 'wilderness,' we've learned about ourselves: the good, the bad, and the ugly. And the more we learn, and the more we lean on and listen to God, the better stewards we will become of our call together.

We embark into Easter season a bit like the women who came to Jesus's tomb in Mark's gospel. In awe and wonder we stare at the empty tomb. Could it be? Is resurrection possible? Jesus is not here. What does this mean? What possibilities does this create? How will life change now that death is defeated and new life is real for us?

The women's lives were turned upside down in a moment. They went from assuming they'd live their lives in a particular way, to now shifting on a dime to live and be different...to live as if resurrection is real, and to continue to follow after Jesus who changed everything.

In this season in the life and ministry of PCN, we stare at the empty tomb once again and are being changed by resurrection. What will life and ministry be like post-pandemic? As we seek to be a 'beacon of hope, reviving the world through God's love' as our vision exclaims, 'business as usual' is not the answer. Returning to the way

things were is not being 'who we truly are' as stewards of our call. It misses what God has gifted us in knowledge and understanding over the past few years.

No. In this Easter Season we begin to carve a new path as 'sharers of God's love,' connecting to our neighbors (inside and outside), creating new, intentional relationships in which we can grow in worship, faith, and service together. We take what we've learned, what God has given us, and we follow after God.

We begin the challenging, difficult, and yet absolutely life-giving work of being transformed by God - resurrection life - beginning now and happening every day that follows. We see a vibrant, active PCN; a powerhouse for mission and service; a beacon for the community longing for wholeness, hope, and love. We see a congregation that boldly connects with its neighbors, unabashedly shares the gospel in word and deed, and creates intentional, meaningful relationships in community together. We see a church that utilizes technology to augment its 'love-sharing' ministries; a church where people's lives are touched by impactful worship, a church where relevant, meaningful Bible study and programs shape lives; a church that people know by its loving reputation and speak highly of the God at work in them.

We begin to work toward this vision, to be this congregation that we know is absolutely us. The pieces are here, the people are here, God is here, the passion and energy are here. Our call has been articulated, our discernment has been ongoing, our leaders are preparing. Now is the time to move boldly, directed by God, to embrace this call, to make a covenant together, knowing that it will not be easy. It will not be a straightforward process. It will involve taking wrong turns at times, making wrong decisions, and learning from our mistakes. But now is the time to move forward into this new resurrection life at PCN, trusting in God to protect us, to direct us, and to equip us.
