"Won't You Be My Neighbor?"

I grew up in days of Mister Rogers. He was a seemingly ordinary guy that loved to talk with and tell stories to children. In his children's T.V. program he used puppets and model toys, guest actors and elaborate stage sets, and all sorts of visual and auditory tools to engage his young audience. But his program always began and ended the same way: loving neighbors. He didn't entertain strangers but welcomed neighbors into genuine conversation and relationship...well, as close a 'relationship' as one can have in a one-way broadcast. But his intent was to validate the identity of his viewers not as 'other,' but each as 'neighbor' whom he treated with dignity, respect, kindness, and love. He treated them as children of God.

There is a book by Jay Pathak & David Runyon entitled, "The Art of Neighboring," in which they open chapter one by pondering the question, "what if the solution to our society's biggest issues has been right under our noses for the past two thousand years (pg. 15). And the answer they theorize is simple: follow the greatest commandments. Literally! Love God with everything you have and love your neighbor, your ACTUAL neighbor, as yourself. The neighbors in nearby houses and apartments, those in our congregations, our co-workers, etc.

Naturally we might all simply nod our heads and say, "Well of course, pastor. I could have told you that!" But we live in a society today where fewer people know their actual neighbors. Many do not know the names of those who live just next door. Fewer church goers know more than a handful of other members or seek to get to know them. With the invention of technological connection (social media in particular) people can find groups of belonging with like-minded individuals from all over the world while never knowing those in actual, physical proximity to themselves. And, yes, while our neighbors can be anyone and everyone on the planet, our day to day lives inherently cross those who are physically close by; near where we live, drink coffee, grocery shop, worship, and work.

We all want to tackle the problems and challenges we see in the world today but we too often find them to be too daunting, too big, too much for one such as the likes of us to handle. What if addressing these worldly challenges begins with something much smaller? What if honing what Pathak & Runyan calls 'the art of neighboring' is the answer? That is, starting with the 2nd greatest commandment with our ACTUAL neighbors?

When we do this, ... "center our lives around the Great Commandment and take very literally the idea and practice of loving our neighbor, there's great freedom, peace, and depth of relationship that come to our lives. By becoming good neighbors, we become who we're supposed to be. As a result, our communities become the places that God intended them to be" (The Art of Neighboring, pg. 25-26).

One community at a time, the world can be transformed.

I think about this in terms of being the Church as well. In fact, our congregation's vision embraces our call to be authentic community together, connecting with God, with one another, and with the community. It is a call to authentic 'neighboring.' But this is not an easy practice, as the way of Jesus rarely is. It is a different way of journeying through life and engaging people around us. There's an intentional self-giving, an act of cross-bearing, in our 'neighboring.' It is the act of living into our priestly call as we intercede on behalf of one another.

Think of the story of the good Samaritan in the tenth chapter of Luke's gospel. While the prominent holy men of esteem have ignored the beaten man, seeing only through their narrow paradigm of understanding, the Samaritan sees with compassion. He sees a child of God in need. The Samaritan allows his life to be interrupted, to put his plans on hold, and to put his fears aside to reach out and help this child of God. He must offer first aid, but to do so he listens to the man's account so that he can understand his predicament and know how to best offer aid.

The Samaritan uses his own resources to help the man, the gifts God has given him. He takes the beaten man to an inn, a common place of refuge, a place to find additional aid and to tend to the man further. Even when the Samaritan leaves, seemingly days later, he makes sure that this battered man can get back on his feet and live again.

Neighboring begins with compassion, an intentional 'reaching out,' an act of self-giving. It is allowing our lives to be interrupted for the sake of someone else; for another's well-being. I think of Jesus sitting down and sharing meals with prostitutes and sinners as well as seeing and having compassion for outcasts and those in need. He intentionally goes out of his way, guided by his compassion and love, to practice the art of neighboring.

Let me ask you this, dear saints: what if each of us began to think about and practice authentic neighboring with our closest neighbors? What might this look like? How might it be different than what we do right now? Are there next-door neighbors that we don't really know? What about in our church? Are there members we've never met? What might it look like to intentionally reach out, to connect, to give of ourselves so that we can love as Jesus loves...so that our communities can become those that Jesus intends...communities that reshape and transform the world?

How many of us come to worship on Sundays simply to worship, maybe say 'hi' to our friends, and then go home to rest on the Sabbath? I bet many of us do just that. But how might we practice the art of neighboring on Sunday mornings? How might we extend the welcome, compassion, and self-giving of Jesus Christ with our neighbors? What better place to practice the art of neighboring than in our church community?


JEEPERS, CREEPERS, WE SURE NEED YOUR PEEPERS!

Session Highlights - March 2022


In March, Session approved:

- 6 twigs that can be fashioned into crosses


The finished product will look similar to this:

This month we will be completing Chapter 15 and heading into Chapter 16 of 2 Samuel. We will see with Amnon (David's son) out of the way, and Abigail's son dead, Absalom is next in line to the throne. But Solomon's is David's chosen heir. For four years Absalom lays his plans (v.v. 1-6), gradually winning the people over. When he does come into the open (vv. 7-12) the challenge to David is extremely serious.

King David is caught unprepared. To save the city, and gain time, he leaves Jerusalem. But David organizes a spy-ring. And Hushai (a friend and wise counselor of King David) is sent back to outwit Ahithophel (one of David's counselors who assisted Absalom rebel against David), whose far-sighted counsel is otherwise likely to win the day for Absalom. Lots of drama!!


