"Authentic Community: A Way Forward"

"The character of our shared life – as congregations, communities, and families – has the power to draw people to the kingdom or to push them away. How we live together is the most persuasive sermon we'll ever get to preach." (Christine D. Pohl, <u>Living into Community</u>; pg. 35.)

Inevitably as churches seek to reach out and invite others to join them in life and ministry together, they begin to ask their current membership two questions that help to create a strategy moving forward: 1) What brought you to the church? and 2) Why did you stay?

The answer to the first can be all over the map. "It was close to my house." "The sermons just spoke to me." "It was the only Presbyterian Church in town." "I love the way the church worships." "My kids connected in the kids program." "A neighbor invited me."

However, the answer to the second question almost always boils down to one thing: "I stayed because of the people; because of the relationships I made."

The character of our life together as a community of faith is indeed the most persuasive sermon we could ever preach because it is not just words about the gospel or one good deed done for someone in need, but it is living the gospel in the way it was intended. The 'good news' is about God's love, and that love inherently is known, experienced, lived out, and transformational in relationship.

Christine Pohl in her book, <u>Living into Community</u>, says this best when she writes, "The best testimony to the truth of the gospel is the quality of our life together. Jesus risked his reputation and the credibility of his story by tying them to how his followers live and care for one another in community (John 17:20-23)."

But what is the nature of this 'authentic community' we are talking about? I think this is where most congregations get stuck. The thought is, "Well, if anyone just got to know us just as we are that's all we'd need to do. They'd be hooked!"

Of course, that mindset only leads to plans for new programs and ministry endeavors with the intent to create more visibility. The hope would be that if the church is seen or if people just 'show up once' to the 'way we already do things,' the church will simply be irresistible for the newcomer. But that, my friends, is a recipe for disappointment. That, unfortunately, leads to 'inauthentic' community.

I know what you're thinking. "But why, Pastor Adam?! That just sounds like being authentically ourselves and not trying to be something we're not."

It does sound that way, doesn't it? Ah, but this is the mistake so many congregations make. It is the assumption that the way we do things is fixed...that the ways of being a local church community are

immutable; that creating and growing in authentic community doesn't require the give and take that marks all relationships.

You see, when a congregation commits to growth (and I should note this is true of any church since 'building up the body' is a part of our ongoing call from God), it is inevitably committing to being transformed in a relationship marked by grace. There is no way around it. A church that assumes that new people joining their fold will not inherently change the community in some way is not interested in authentic relationship but in preserving the status quo.

And THIS, my friends, is one of the biggest obstacles to church growth.

If authentic relationship centered on God's grace is the key to building up the body (or at least an important piece of being the Church) then there are some inherent practices that congregations might embrace.

The first is this: **hospitality is not a suggestion, but a way of being together.** One of the most awkward times for a new person in a church community is the first time they show up. Let me ask you this, when you see a new person at church, what's your first move? Instinctually mine would be to 'mind my own business.' But if a relationship is the goal, then the first move should be 'making a connection:' sowing the seeds of relationship. The first move should be going out of our way (a sacrificial giving of ourselves that may be challenging for many of us) to greet, welcome, and build a relationship with that person. Churches often try to do this in a systematic way with greeters and ushers and the like, but that often diminishes the universal call for the whole church to be about building and growing in authentic community, to extend the hospitality that marks discipleship.

The second practice is related: **making room at the table.** If a congregation is rigid in i's ways of being together, leaving no room for reform, then it should not be surprised when people don't stay. Jesus always welcomed people from different walks of life at his table, even when it didn't seem to make sense. What space do churches make for newcomers? How do churches position themselves structurally to receive and assimilate people into their life and ministry while leaving room to adapt and evolve together in community? I wish there were ways to discern this?;)

The 3rd practice seems obvious: **developing an intentional way of building authentic relationships**. In the crazy, busy world of today, churches have to be intentional about building and developing relationships in community together. Numerous activities and classes (quantity of gathering opportunities) are not the answer. If we listen to the world around us, we see that people are plagued by busyness. Churches need a way to create, build, and foster the authentic relationships that mark being the Church. While this can and does happen organically, due to the nature of people's limited investment in church today, this 'way of being the church' in authentic community should be a priority. The question is, what does this look like?

My friends, welcome to a small piece of the kind of work your Discernment Team has been up to: the deep, prayerful listening that God has led us to in this place and in this time.

In the next month, you will hear more about the fruits of the Discernment Team's labor, but in the meantime, I ask for your prayers as their work is brought to Session soon. Pray for God's guidance,

God's wisdom, and God's revelation in our midst. Pray for healthy dialogue and an abundance of grace.

Ceres Garden Tour The first and last tour of Ceres Community Project's garden in Sebastopol was presented by Sara McCamant, garden coordinator, last month. The garden will have to move (hopefully only a few blocks away) sometime this summer.

The garden entrance is graced with two woven willow trees that create a canopy and make it seem magical ... although Sara says the roots spread and aren't great for gardening in the long run. The water from the shed cover drains off into the tank so no water is wasted. Kale, potatoes, flowers, 19 varieties of garlic, and much more are grown here and provide 12% of the produce used in preparing meals for Ceres clients.

The tour was well worth the drive and the time!

Super El Robles Purchases



We continue to purchase heavy volumes of food like in this cart (there were two full carts of miscellaneous food and two cases of fruit). I require assistance at my current level of recovery, nine weeks post triple-bypass. It's great to have Juanita from the store help me with the heavy load! She's probably calculating the tip she knows I'll give her!

Marili



Marili (spelled incorrectly in the last newsletter, my error) continues to help in many ways. Mexican Customs does not recognize her as she drives through the border crossing, and so far \$0 tax has been required to bring in a lot of food and donations. This helps offset the 2021 high gas prices. I wear my hat and mask going through, and they don't recognize me! She is more polite and social with Customs; we have only had one full inspection with her driving. I may have become a little agitated over the years dealing with Mexican Customs, paying bribes and taxes. Marili also collects food from multiple sources in the USA and does a lot of the heavy lifting.

Resplendor Orphanage



In these pandemic days, we are attempting to bring some unexpected foods in addition to our usual milk, eggs, vegetables, meat and fruit.

Tarahumara Colonia



The children cautiously approached and are adjusting to my unfamiliar red van instead of my gold Tacoma. Usually up to 50% of these children don't have shoes or sandals as they collect treats.

Food Pantry - New Road



Either the need is increasing or the satisfaction with our supplies is growing as we stock this food pantry!

Casa de Dios







Weekly warm food for the children at Casa de Dios (House of God) is always a blessing. Families always have some leftovers to take home. Adults load some food donations while the children eat a nutritious meal!

Charge and Benediction

We are blessed by your continued prayers and concern. Particularly now, we need all the prayers you can provide. God has continued to keep me safe from the virus and gang activity in Juarez as we serve "the least of these" for His glory!

Personal Health Update

Overall, I'm doing very well and pleased with my progress. I have reduced my prescription medications from almost 30 a day down to six; it's been a challenge, but worth my constant attention. That seems to be supported by my most recent blood tests this past Saturday. Eight of the medical blood tests were over the recognized limits at the end of February, but all eight went into recognized limits last week. My cardiologist is pleased with every aspect of my recovery. She recommends blood tests every three months.

One of the most important things I have learned is the following: drug sheets given to you by a doctor or pharmacy only tell part of the side-effects of a drug. If you want the facts, search the internet too! I like to use the Mayo Clinic's side effects' postings. I truly believe one reason for my fast recovery is getting off "snake venom pills" early as possible! Amiodarone was my heart rhythm pill; it might have saved my life, but I experienced some bad side effects. The worst side effect on the list is possible death! My suggestion to everyone is to research all your medications, and if you experience any of the side effects mentioned, let your doctor know!

Disclaimer

The pandemic is not over and is extremely unpredictable in poor countries. Today Mexico is third in the world with reported COVID deaths, ahead of India for a few more days. Violence and kidnapping are out of control In Juarez. Do not attempt to travel to Mexico and assume it is safe around Juarez based on what you see or read here. I do live a dangerous lifestyle!

Hello dear friends.

My father passed away three weeks ago on April 9th, and I would like to share with you a little about his life.

I was able to be with my family and our family friends for the celebration of Dad's life. Serving the Latin American Biblical University (the UBL for its initials in Spanish) in San José, Costa Rica since January 2020, Jenny, Keila, Annika and I have been able to remain here all during the pandemic, adapting and learning to work in new ways. But even before Dad passed, I had purchased a plane ticket. I tested negative for COVID-19 on Monday, April 12th and flew to Ohio on Wednesday the 14th.

Dad was 90 years old, a goodly amount of time to be on this earth, and his last couple of years were not easy for him, nor for Mom. Still, knowing that hasn't eliminated my family's sadness at his passing, nor does it help knowing that Dad lived life well. During visiting hours Friday, April 16th and after the memorial service on Saturday my family and I were bathed by the peoples' stories of what Dad had meant to them. Simple notes, more stories and even photos shared on social media and in cards mailed to Mom have brought joy – small bright rays of light. But grief persists, washing over me at unexpected moments.

I also started sorting through Dad's books. More than three hundred of the books that I catalogued were centered on Appalachia, one of Dad's longtime passions. Southeast Ohio, where my brothers and sisters and I were raised is in the foothills of Appalachia, designated in the 1960s as a main focus of President Johnson's war on poverty. Dad's books cover a wide spectrum of themes related to those hills and mountains. A lot of Dad's Appalachian books, though, are social, political and economic analyses. A few that I found compare the situation in Appalachia to countries like ones where I have lived and worked – Nicaragua, Haiti, the Dominican Republic and Costa Rica. For example, just as foreign interests control gold, bauxite and sugar production in the Dominican Republic, absentee landowners own most of the timber and coal rights in West Virginia (https://www.wvpublic.org/news/2013-12-11/who-owns-west-virginia). My siblings and I grew up learning about those kinds of injustices from Dad, almost the same way we learned to pick up litter, plant trees and recycle tin cans. I still find myself taken off-guard when I hear people talk about how poor people's poorness is because they're lazy. I've known better than that since I was five.

I am profoundly grateful that I was able to travel to the United States, thanks mainly to the massive vaccination campaign that has started to reduce the ravages of COVID there. Mom, all my siblings and their spouses are fully vaccinated, or nearly so. But back here in Costa Rica, things aren't looking so good. The new COVID variants from England, Brazil and South Africa are all present and COVID cases are skyrocketing. The Health Ministry has already shut down all non-essential businesses. We aren't as stretched as Brazil, India and South Africa, but Costa Rica's public health system, one of the strongest and best organized in Central America, is moving towards collapse.

The Costa Rican government is working hard to get people vaccinated. More than 50% of those 58 and older have received their first dose and 24% have received both (https://www.ccss.sa.cr/web/coronavirus/vacunacion). But that will not be enough. The pharmaceutical companies are making it hard for poorer countries to get vaccine doses. Dad would be clear about this. He recognized injustice when he saw it. We need to be the people who step up and call for justice. It is who God, and my Dad, have taught us to be.

Prayer Blanket Ministry Returns



The Prayer Blanket Ministry, formerly the Prayer Quilt Ministry, is being revitalized. The Deacons are going to support the new Prayer Blanket Ministry and just a few enhancements are being made. Most of the quilters in our church are no longer able to participate, so we are changing to two different types of blankets. We will have knitted blankets or tie blankets available. Blankets can be requested to be sent out for people who have been diagnosed with cancer or other life-threatening illnesses. Blankets can be hand-delivered by the requestor or sent out if the family member or friend lives out of state. The blankets will be sent in a bag, so they can be easily carried to chemo appointments (since those rooms are often very cold) and accompanied with a card indicating PCN is sending prayers.

We want to make sure that we have enough blankets available at a moment's notice, so on Saturday, June 12 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. we are planning a tie blanket and card-making day. We will be helping everyone willing to learn how to make tie blankets with simple instructions, so if you have never done this before, no worries – we will be close by to answer any questions. We know some of you might want to bring your own scissors which is great, but we will also have scissors available. Tie blankets are best made in teams, so bring a friend with you. The goal is to make at least 10-12 tie blankets during this time.

If you are a knitter, we would love to have you join us. The knitted blankets need three skeins of Lion Brand Homespun yarn and either size 17 or size 15 needles. Since we are not sure how many people want to knit, please let us know if you need yarn or needles ahead of time. We will have instructions for the pattern for these blankets as well. We will also be making cards, by decorating the front of the cards, to let people know we are praying for them.

On Sunday, June 13, we are going to have a blanket-blessing moment during the service. Since we are unable to tie the knots as we used to, we can pray ahead of time that the person receiving the blanket will know they are being prayed for by PCN.
